NOTES OF THE OXHILL ANNUAL PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY 23RD MAY 2006 AT 8.00 PM IN THE VILLAGE HALL

Following the May elections, Parish Councillors David Hill, Tom Heritage and Gwyneth Adams remain in office. Brian Emmerson and Stephen Hackett did not stand for re-election, therefore two vacancies exist and these will be filled by co-option at the July meeting.

A vote of thanks was given to Brian Emmerson and Stephen Hackett for their services to the community as Parish Councillors.

MATTERS DISCUSSED

Arising from the Parish Meeting

The question of a possible funding requirement for the adult Learning Centre and Nursery facility at Tysoe. This would be considered only if supported by all other parishes in the surrounding area and after consultation with the village.

Coventry Airport

A letter from solicitors, Messrs. Jones Day of London, acting on behalf of the West Midlands International Airport Limited (WMIAL) was sent to the Chairman of the Parish Council on 13th April, outlining plans for the development of revised Noise Preferential Routes/Standard Departure Routes (NPR/SDR) from Coventry. About 500 councils received a similar letter. It was subsequently ascertained that the new routes would pass some 6 km to the east of Oxhill at an altitude (above sea level) of no less than 6000 ft. The 6 km is subject to a possible variation of 1.5 km either side of the new NPR/SDR.

In practical terms this means that aircraft taking off from Coventry would pass over say, Ratley and would affect Oxhill minimally, if at all, concerning noise pollution. The Parish Council has responded to Jones Day to the effect that there is no comment on WMIAL's proposals at the moment, but reserves the right to do so if necessary. We can assume that many communities under the NPR/SDRs will be affected and will be making strong representation.

If any resident has a comment on the above, or would like further information, please contact a Parish Councillor.

Planning

Application for extension to form living accommodation at Moat House was returned with no objection.

Application to raise and repair roof of pig sty and change its use to stable and store was returned with no objection.

Permission had been granted for rear extension at Stablecroft.

Finance

Mandatory Insurance cover of £294.28 was paid. Honorarium of £150 was paid to the Clerk. Audit Accounts for the year ended 31 March 2006, Notes to the Account, Variation statement and Bank Reconciliation were presented to the meeting and signed by the Chairman.

Verges

A request for verges to be made good following work on the former Methodist Chapel will be made.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR SPEEDING IN OXHILL

Hi George,

It has been some months since the above "hot" topic raised its head, once again, but nevertheless timely.

As a relative newcomer to the village (7 years) I made a conscious decision not to join the fierce debate this subject causes until I felt a little more established.

However, I feel it is now time to make a contribution.

Over the years I have read and been amused by the comments made at ways of tackling this on-going problem, anything from a "quiet word" in the ear of the miscreants (very difficult at 60mph), to do nothing at all – what was it, the fear of "urbanisation" as I recall!

Fact 1, this problem is not going to go away – in fact it will probably worsen.

Fact 2, should anything untoward happen, i.e. a serious accident, then it probably won't be someone from the village who causes it – they will either be passing through, e.g. the blue Audi estate from Tysoe (the blue is now black by the way he's got a new motor) or visiting us.

I live on the Main Street "drag" from Oxhill House to the White House and witness the buses, agricultural contractors, cars and motorbikes seeing how fast they can accelerate from one end to the other. A similar problem exists on the Whatcote Road/Kineton Road stretch where on many occasions I am sure a speeding limit does not exist!

And I would add that it is a whole cross section of drivers – young, old, male and female who revel in the challenge – nothing stereotypical.

It is inevitable and only a matter of time before someone is injured, possibly fatally. We will then have the inevitable wringing of hands and mutterings of what should have been done, rather than what we did to prevent it.

Many examples exist, both in the UK and particularly in France where "urbanisation", and here I mean the introduction of traffic calming measures, have been successfully introduced into many stunningly beautiful villages like our own without taking away the their uniqueness. So there are solutions to the problem.

Am I alone in my concern or will the subject of speeding in Oxhill continue for another two years? Time for action methinks!

POLICE LIAISON

I met Sergeant Darren Fretwell who has taken over from Warren Ayres at Shipston. The prime objective of the meeting was to exchange information on local matters, specifically regarding this Parish.

Darren appears to have been well briefed by his predecessor and is aware of all recently reported incidents. He is, however, concerned that things which could and should be reported to the police are not being reported with enough detail for the Police to take action. The Police are often criticised for being virtually invisible when in fact they can only act on information passed, unless of course they just happen to be passing when something is happening - a very long shot. Any incident which a member of the Parish considers to be suspicious, illegal or anti-social must be reported to the Police directly before they can do anything about it. Unless an individual or the wider community is prepared to report, nothing can be done. Can I say yet again that I am not the person to whom an incident should be reported, although I would be very interested to hear of it subsequently. Sergeant Fretwell can be contacted via the Stratford number: 01789 414111, Extension 4588, Voicemail 11740, or in the case of non-urgency, by email: darren.fretwell@warwickshire.pnn.police.uk.

The 999 option remains the primary option for extreme urgency where a threat to life and limb is thought to exist. Regarding suspicious activity, I have been informed that there are a number of teams active in the south of our County which are in the business of either distraction burglary or surveying properties with a view to a follow-up burglary. These people often pose as officials of a known organisation or as contractors seeking new business. Whatever details can be obtained on these visitors, physical descriptions, mannerisms, car details, time, date, place etc., are useful to record or, in the case of serious suspicion, to report. I am personally quite critical of the Police, and have misgivings about their operational priorities, staffing levels, communication skills and so on, all of which I have expressed to Darren and others. Notwithstanding this, I think that the Police are trying to do a good job round here and deserve, and need, our help and support.
