Is the Feast day of Saints Chad and Joavan. Why only two?

It is also the day in 1995 when two competing teams of scientists using different detectors at the Fermi National Accelerator Laboratory in Batavia, Illinois, announced that they had found the top quark. Since few of us knew it had been lost, this last phrase may need a little explanation, so here goes.

Baryons and mesons are complex subatomic particles built from more elementary objects, the quarks. Six types of quark, together with their corresponding antiquarks, are necessary to account for all the known hadrons. The flavours of quark have acquired the names up, down, charm, strange, top, and bottom (Salt & Vinegar, Beef & Onion and Prawn Cracker are no longer used.) Physicists say the meaning of these somewhat unusual names is not important. Physicists always consider the most interesting things to be unimportant; it is in their nature.

The table below gives you some information about the properties of quarks.

There! That was fun, wasn't it? You must understand that antiquarks exist for all flavours of quark, and that they have opposite values for all of the numbers listed in the table. Physicists had to invent them because otherwise their sums did not add up right.

In addition to combining to form simplistic particles such as protons and neutrons, three quarks can be combined to form a larger particle in such a way that their spins do not cancel. The result is a short-lived resonance state called a delta (Nile, Mississippi, etc.). The up and down quarks can combine in four ways, up/up/up, up/up/down, up/down/down and down/down/down. There is also a fifth possibility, ignored by most physicists, of down/down/deeperanddown. This is important because it gives us the Status Quo.

I hope that makes it all clear. There was once a wise man who said "The number of particles in sub-atomic physics is an accurate measure of the ignorance of physicists about what actually happens". Another theory suggests that all the sub-atomic particles are themselves formed from just three sub-atomic particles. These are called nigs, nogs and nags. Don't worry about it.

There may be a test next month. On the other hand, there just might not be.

JUNK MAIL and SALES CALLS

If you wish to reduce the amount of unsolicited mail that you receive through the post, register with the *Mailing Preference* Service (MPS). Simply send your name and address to the MPS at Freepost 22, London W1E 7EZ or register on-line at www.mpsonline.org.uk

Your name remains on the MPS register for five years after which you will have to register again.

If you wish to reduce the number of sales and marketing calls you receive on your home or business telephone, call the Direct Marketing Association's *Telephone Preference Service* (TPS) on 0800 398893 or register on-line at www.tpsonline.org.uk

Should you telephone the TPS you are given the choice of selecting an automated registration service or speaking to a real person.

Marketing agencies use computers to dial telephone numbers held on a database or to randomly generate them. If sales staff cannot keep up with calls fed to them, this might well result in you receiving a 'silent' call. If you have been troubled by calls where the phone rings but on answering there is no one there, you may wish to register your number on the *Silent Callgard Service* on 0870 4443969.

Complaints about text messages and automated voice recordings are covered by new regulations overseen by the *Information Commissioner's Office (ICO)* - the government body responsible for enforcing the regulations. NATURE NOTES for MARCH

March is the month of new life – in Anglo-Saxon Hrethamonath, the month of the goddess Hretha.

In old country lore 8th March is the day to start to sow garden herbs and water them, but hope for a dry, dusty month to benefit the crops: "In March; the moon being new, sow garlic, chervil, marjoram, white poppy, double marigolds, thyme and violets. At the full moon, chicory, fennel and apples of love. At the wane, artichokes, basil, cucumbers, spinach, gillyflowers, cabbages, lettuce, burnets, leeks, and savory." – Markham, The English Housewife, 1683.

Over the last couple of weeks while working in Cheltenham, almost daily I have been watching a nuthatch busying itself in the garden. This small attractive bird is plump and short tailed, with blue-grey upper parts, buff underparts, and reddish flanks. It has a strong pointed bill with a black stripe running down each side of its head; both male and female are alike. The old gardener working at the house tells me in Gloucestershire they call them woodjars or nuthackers. Their strong beaks are capable of dealing with food as large and hard as hazel nuts and acorns. They jam the nut into a crevice of a tree or wall and with the weight of their whole body, they bring their beak hammering down until the shell is broken. The nuthatch I have been watching spends a lot of time in a large oak tree, tapping the trunk in the manner of a woodpecker, which apparently earns it the name of woodhacker and woodcracker. The jarring sound of its hacking has also given rise to the name woodjar and jarbird. It tends to be a bird of parks, parkland, large town gardens (I have never seen one in Oxhill), and woodland. It scuttles about the tree upwards, downwards or sideways with equal agility, sometimes doing its "hacking" from an upside down position. The nuthatch is in fact the only British bird that can travel 'down' a tree. It was once thought that they roosted head down! but they actually choose holes in tree trunks or walls to build their nests. They make the entrance hole smaller by stopping it up with mud, until it is exactly the right size.

By 30 March badger cubs now begin to appear above ground, but beware: "He hath very sharp teeth, and is therefore accounted a deep biting beast; his legs (as some say) are longer on the right side than the left, and therefore he runneth best when he getteth to the side of a hill" - Edward Topsell, The History of Four-footed Beasts, 1607.
