

NATURE NOTES FOR AUGUST

August the 5th, St James's Day, Old Style; traditionally the beginning of the oyster eating season.

Greengrocers rise at dawn of sun August the fifth – come haste away To Billingsgate the thousand run Tis Oyster Day! Tis Oyster Day! Hone Every-day book 1829

I used to love oysters [Jonathan Swift said 'He was a bold man that first ate an oyster'] but then I was poisoned by one and was very ill for a couple of weeks, consequently I've never risked one again!



The Hobby Falcon

I recently posted on OWLS FB page, how Jane and I had stood and watched for quite some minutes a rare falcon, the Hobby, hunting over Manor pond. The hobby, Falco subbuteo, is one of our most beautiful falcons. It is our second smallest falcon [the Merlin being the smallest] and in flight can look like a large and languid swift, its wings long and scythe shaped flickering before each strong, graceful wing beat. The name Hobby comes from the old French 'hobereau' meaning 'to stir' which it certainly does, it will often stir up swallows going to roost; it will fly about in a casual manner and then like an Exocet missile it will whirlwind into the richness of swallows and pick one off. They will also take swifts and house martins.

Some years ago I watched a piece of cine film, taken in Warwickshire, where for eight minutes a hobby pursued a swift, the pair performing the most incredible aerobatics, the swift continually trying to evade the hobby, until the hobby came powering up from beneath the swift and...BAM! They will also take small birds, insects and unusually dragonflies. I suspect the one we watched was doing just this. The dragonfly is the fastest flying insect, apparently its initial acceleration is faster than a formula one racing car, but the Hobby is faster! A couple of years ago one flew low and fast just skimming the ground across our garden and took a male blackbird which was easily as big as the falcon, but he still managed to land with it and get off the ground and take flight with it.

They are summer visitors and every year I catch sight of one or two and I think there are a pair that take this area with the vale of Whatcote as their territory. I have recently read that there could be up to 2000 now overwintering in the UK mainly down to global warming.

Other colloquial names include Van-winged Hawk, Tree Falcon, Riphook and Robin. This last one is rather strange; it comes from the word robinet a slender type of seventeenth century one-pounder cannon, and other sizes of cannons were also named after birds of prey; there were sakers, falcons and falconets and the firearm known as a musket was also named after a male sparrowhawk, all fast [speed of shot] and lethal!

I'm sure many of you will have noticed the Latin scientific name and will remember the table top football game called Subbuteo which was created by Peter Adolph. He wanted to call the game Hobby, but the trademark was denied, and so he went for

the Latin!

August 13th, The Feast of St Cassian, a severe Christian schoolmaster disliked by his pagan pupils, who stabbed him to death with their iron pen-nibs: he is the patron saint of schoolteachers! I hear pupils are much better behaved these days!

Summer holidays are upon us so the recipe this month is definitely one for children (of all ages) to make with some help. Mars Bar Crispy cakes have been a holiday journey picnic staple for the Mercer family for many years, purchased at Shipston Bakery, along with Coronation Chicken baguettes, on our way to the M5. How pleased were we when one daughter went to Plymouth University as that meant more trips on the M5! So ingrained is this tradition that all my daughters make their own for parties and special occasions. As I write, my granddaughter has just taken a freshly-made tray of Mars Bar Crispy cakes to share on her last day at Preschool.



The recipe below has been produced after a long text discussion with my daughters: one makes a 23cm square tin quantity and the other a 20cm square tin quantity. The recipe below is for a 20cm square tin but feel free to multiply all the ingredients to fit different tins. I tend to work on tin areas as quite often I don't have the correct size or shape tin for recipes; this recipe will make 400 square cm.

MARS BAR CRISPY CAKE

5 Mars Bars (51g size) 150g butter 1 dessert spoon golden syrup 100g Rice Krispies 200g milk chocolate

- 1. Line a 20cm (8") square tin with baking parchment. Part fill a saucepan with water and find a heatproof bowl that will sit over the saucepan, not touching the water.
- 2. Chop up the Mars Bars and place in the heatproof bowl with the butter and syrup. Put the bowl over the saucepan and place on a hob. Bring the water to boiling point and simmer very gently.
- 3. As the Mars Bars, butter and syrup start to melt, stir constantly until it combines to form a uniform liquid. (Lucy's tip: the Mars bars and butter take FOREVER to bind but wait until it is silky and smooth and not looking separated).
- 4. Take the bowl off the saucepan and stir in the Rice Krispies. Pour into the prepared tin and press to level.
- 5. Melt the chocolate. (I would use a microwave but you can melt it over the saucepan again, if you prefer. Whatever you do, don't overheat it!) Pour chocolate over the Rice Krispie mixture, bang the tin firmly on the worktop to level the surface, then allow to set in the fridge before cutting into squares.

If you want a marbled effect as shown in the photo below, chill the mixture after step 4, then melt 100g milk or dark chocolate and 100g white chocolate separately. Dot the

chocolates over the surface of the crispy base in a rough chessboard pattern. Take a knife and drag the tip diagonally through the two chocolates until you get a marbled effect that you are happy with. Alternatively, use a cocktail stick to make swirly patterns. Bang the tin firmly on the worktop to level the surface.





WOT2GROW COMMUNITY ORCHARD

Pruning has continued unabated despite the weather and the majority of the stone fruit trees have been trimmed back and reduced in height. The apples are also getting attention

especially the ones with a heavy crop, which is not all of them, by trimming back branches which have grown too much since the winter pruning and continuing to thin out the apples.

The fruit cage has been put up over the red and white currants which have pretty heavy crops again this year and the blackbirds just love them!! Gooseberries, logans and tayberries are all starting to be picked and yet again the summer raspberries had their first picking in the week around July 6th, this date seems to be constant no matter what the weather has been doing.

This year we have a first new wild flower. In all of the 0.8ha (two acres in old terms) we have one pyramid orchid!!! Very pretty and a joy to behold as the orchard is a community space for growing fruit trees and soft fruits and not a wild flower meadow.

Plenty of work to do going forward so why not get involved and help out with various tasks at your orchard. Contact one of us to find out more.

The Community Orchard is just behind the allotments on the Shenington Road in Tysoe.

SPEEDING AND TRAFFIC CALMING IN OXHILL

latest situation

The Parish Council has been organising 'random anonymous speed sampling' recordings at various times of the day, between 2th April and 10th June using a hand held mini radar speed camera located half way along the straight part of Whatcote Rd.

During a total of 185 minutes, a total of 118 cars and other vehicles were logged, 40.5 % of which were measured at 35 mph and above. 9.3% were above 40mph. The fastest recorded was 55 mph. Both uphill and downhill numbers and percentages speeding were similar.

The Safety Engineering Team, Traffic and Road Safety group, Warwickshire County Council has indicated that if our speed checking showed that more than 30% of traffic was over 35 mph, than we had a good case for better police action to control this. So we have every indication that we may be able to approach the police with a good case.




Whilst there are no changes in the attitude of the various bodies (Police, Highways and County Council) that control what we can do or they are prepared to do, there is a new community package being introduced during August to try to help with these local concerns. Whilst we do not yet know the details of this package, we have been promised priority in receiving this.

Community speed camera operations were still being encouraged, but unless we can do this on a regular basis (e.g. every two weeks) it is not effective, and we already know this from previous experience.

Our priority is to have a moveable flashing speed indicator sign which shows the actual speed to the drivers, but this is not currently allowed by the 'authorities'. If we can produce some more data, possibly from Green Lane and the Kineton Rd entry to the village, this may help in achieving our current goal. We are therefore looking for volunteers to help with this monitoring. It's not difficult to do, but just needs people keen to help.









SUDOKU FOR KIDS
