MUSIC AT THE MANOR '24

We at Nicodemus, are thrilled to report that Music at the Manor '24 went off really well on it's second year, after a lot of hard work and the generous support of our musicians, sponsors, suppliers and volunteers.

This year we swapped a truck bed for an all singin' and dancin' stage that included stunning lighting, acoustics and 2 huge screens showcasing the musicians as they played, our wonderful sponsors and the work of Nicodemus. There were 4 choices of locally supplied food outlets including Catering Angel Jenny providing a pig roast, chef Kim offering tasty Thai Street Food, mouth-watering Farmhouse ice creams and sorbets from Bee and Ridgeways along with a full pop-up bar and BBQ from Happy Wolf Pubs, Oxhill's local The Peacock and a gin bar finely executed by Pinnock Distillery. As if that wasn't enough, we had artisan roasted coffees and teas provided by Alison with amazing cakes from Origin Eden.

The line up on stage this year included 12 different genres of music to suit all tastes, performed by local young people who not only entertained us superbly, but through their generosity, gave up their time freely to raise awareness of the work of Nicodemus. They also generated much needed funds towards the mentoring of vulnerable and at-risk young people in the UK, Latin America, the Caribbean, USA, Canada and New Zealand. We are so grateful and proud of the young musicians who used their talents and compassion to make such a huge difference to the lives of other young people across the world who would otherwise be living without any hope of being able to break their generational cycle of poverty.

Music at the Manor allowed Nicodemus to give 390 (343 in 2023) marginalised and at-risk young people in the UK and Latin America a trained mentor over 2 years, helping them to achieve a healthy, safe and confident transition into adult life. For many young people the gift

of establishing an authentic and trustworthy relationship with a Mentor enables them to, for instance, learn how to budget, achieve a full education or overcome mental health issues, leave street-living, escape grooming and gang influence. Transition support for prison-leavers, successfully finding and keeping employment or being supported through the destructive effects of abuse and trafficking can also be achieved as the stories of young people shown on the big screens testified to. Nicodemus believes everyone has a purpose and though they may have had a difficult past, that can be turned around and used as a positive influence to help others. In fact, we find that many of the young people who are mentored, with the Nicodemus mentor training and equipped by their life experiences, they are able to effectively speak into other's lives in a positive manner. They are a living example that someone CAN change!



Thank you SO much to all who attended MATM24. Again, a BIG thank you to all who volunteered to make the day what it was! You know who you are and we appreciate you all so very much! Especial gratitude must go to Jo Griffiths who put enormous time and effort into pulling off this fabulous event, along with the rest of our core team: Julia Sibun, Iain Lauchlan, Martyn Davies (from Kineton) and Greg Arcielo from The Music License. We simply couldn't have pulled it off without any of you. Oxhill is an amazing community and it's residents are great at pulling together, getting involved and having fun! Thank you to all of you who gave up time: painting a bespoke stage backdrop, putting up posters, gazebos and signage; and too many to mention who volunteered to hand out fliers, be on the gates, direct parking and pick up very little litter the next morning (some even coming from as far



away as Wales, and The Lake District!) You made it possible to put on this event that will have far reaching positive ripples into the future for many young people and their communities!

OXHILL HOUSE & FARM AUCTION SLIPS

In last's month's Oxhill News we published an auction slip from 1945 for 3 lots in Oxhill. Dominic Connolly sent us information about the owner of the lots, Charles Taylor. Dominic sent us a screenshot of evidence from a probate search and wrote:

"Last month I found out during my research that Charles Taylor was quite a wealthy man when he died during WWII."

TAYLOR Charles of Oxhill Warwickshire died 19 March 1944
Probate Birmingham 26 February to Leonard George
Cornes farmer. Effects £4693 5s. 7d.

Robert Harper, whose grandfather auctioned the Oxhill properties, believes the lots belonging to one home: Fexloe House, located on Main Street. Since 1945 the property has been divided and new homes have been built along Back Lane.

Below we have another Oxhill property auctioned in 1945. We know it was sold for £595 to Leslie Clifford Brooks from Greystones, Kineton as written in the top right corner. How strange to think that in 80 years the property has grown in value to perhaps a 1000 times more - so much increase is so short a time.

Can you guess which Oxhill property this may be?

HOMEMADE TOMATO SOUP / SAUCE

We grow a lot of tomatoes and this is how we like to prepare them. This recipe is more procedural than measured, because over the years we've learned to do it by eye.

- 1. Gather tomatoes
- 2. Include other vegetables from your garden: onion, celery, carrot and bay leaves



- 3. Remove skins from tomatoes by placing each tomato in boiled water for 30 seconds (approx) and then plunge the tomato into iced water. The skins should peel easily.
- 4. Quarter each peeled tomato.
- 5. Rough chop remaining vegetables and fry gently in pot with olive oil.
- 6. Add tomato puree and stir.
- 7. Add tomatoes.
- 8. Add stock and season.
- 9. Cook until vegetables are soft.
- 10. Ladle into blender.











- 11. Whizz blender until tomato mixture is smooth.
- 12. Return to pot.

If you want to eat the tomato mixture as a soup, you may need to add water to the mixture if it is too thick. If you want to eat the tomato mixture as a sauce (my favourite on pasta) then you may need to reduce it to thicken. Soup or sauce can be frozen.


