Ed Bracher and his family had an amazing day in London last month when he received his OBE at an investiture ceremony at Buckingham Palace, officiated by Her Royal Highness The Princess Royal (Princess Anne), on behalf of His Majesty King Charles III.

Ed received his OBE in recognition of his services disabled people, particularly for his work leading and growing Riding for the Disabled Association, but also setting up and chairing an organisation to promote standards and regulation across the field "Equine of Assisted (therapeutic Services" activities for humans, involving horses) – rapidly growing and important area of work. Ed is now the CEO of Dogs for Good - continuing to promote and support the value of the human-animal bond in enabling people to live happier and healthier lives.

Oxhill CC June News

Completed Fixture Match Reports:

Thurs 19th June: Meon Vale and Quinton CC vs Oxhill CC-20 Overs: Oxhill won by 25 runs.

Oxhill CC travelled to Quinton on a hot summer's evening to play the return fixture against Quinton and Meon Vale. Having won the home tie earlier in the season, Oxhill were in confident mood despite being understrength. Oxhill batted first on a very unpredictable wicket. However, each Oxhill bat was able to make useful contributions to the total despite conditions. Dan Morbey scored particularly well; reaching 27 (ret.). The away side set Quinton 153 to win. The Quinton batsmen were never really on the required run rate and fell 25 runs short by the end of their innings. Young Jamie Farris was the pick of the Oxhill bowlers, taking 2 for 34 off 4 overs.

Thurs 26th June: Snitterfield CC vs Oxhill CC-20 Overs: Snitterfield won by 63 runs.

Snitterfield batted first. The home team scored well early on yet Oxhill felt like they were very much in the game; until the final few overs that is. Snitterfield's 10th and 11th batsmen scored 29 and 26 respectively, off very few deliveries, taking their team's total to an unsurmountable 192. Jamie Farris bowled well, taking 3 for 24 off 4. Adam Jordan bowled a

very useful spell too taking 2 for 14 off 4. Captain Dave Whittaker was much annoyed that his figures bore the brunt of the late Snitterfield scoring. He finished with 1-47 off 2 overs. Despite a valiant attempt by Walker, Salmon and Gowers who all retired after scoring 25, the Oxhill batsmen never looked like scoring the required runs and finished on 129 after their allotted overs.

Sunday 29th June: Warwickshire County Council CC vs Oxhill CC-35 Overs: WCCCC won by 26 runs.

WCCCC won the toss and elected to bat. It was a very hot day and the wicket was dry and dusty. Oxhill bowled well, limiting the home side to 182



for 8 off 35 overs. Gowers (3 for 22 off 5) and Orgill (27 for 2 off 6) bowled well. The plaudits go to Adam Jordan however, who though only took 1 wicket, bowled very tidily-conceding a miserly 16 runs off his 7 overs. At tea, Oxhill were confident that they could chase down WCCCC's total. Things certainly started positively with each of Oxhill's first five batsmen scoring well. Dawes (27) and Teesdale (37) notably so. From there, things took a significant downturn. The last five wickets fell for a miserable 14 runs. The batting collapse of rarely seen magnitude meant that the away side ultimately fell 26 runs short of the required total.

Thurs 10th July: Oxhill CC vs Hook Norton CC-20 Overs: Oxhill won by 9 wickets

Gowers (2 for 21 off 4), Jordan (1 for 10 off 4) and Orgill (1 for 12 off 3) all bowled well. With the away team's decent bowling attack, the Oxhill lads were expecting to have to bat well. However, openers Ed Frape and Craig Walker knocked off the majority of the runs in short order. Frape retired on 50 and Walker was eventually dismissed for 44.

Salmon and Simpson saw Oxhill to the winning total with 4 overs to spare; meaning that both sides had plenty of time to enjoy a cider or two and watch the sun go down over Kineton.

The Oxhill lads arrived in Oxford on one of the hottest days of the year not really knowing what to expect of their opposition. The game was played at Baliol College. The wicket was brown and dry and the outfield was very parched. The opposition, as it transpired, were engineers, staff and alumni of Oxford Uni, and generally very good at cricket. Oxford Uni batted first reaching a total of 229 all out. The last wicket pairing put on stand of 52 that somewhat took the game beyond the away side. Matt Walker bowled well with figures of 3 for 37 off 5. Dave Whittaker, however, topped that with 3 for 16 off 6. With temperatures soring and some players struggling with the heat, Oxhill never really looked likely to reach the home side's total and, in the end, fell short by 53 runs.

Salmon batted well to reach 47. Dawes played a useful cameo hitting 29.

Thurs 17th July: Ebrington CC vs Oxhill CC-20 overs: Ebrington CC won by 6 wickets

Oxhill have never beaten Ebrington. The games are always played at Ebrington. They have an excellent batting wicket and they usually sequester some Chipping Campden batsmen to take full advantage of it. Oxhill batted first and scored well reaching 171 off 20 overs. Openers Frape (37), Walker (51 ret.) scored particularly well. Oxhill took to the field feeling hopeful of a maiden victory over the Yubby boys. The away side's bowling attack was strong and scoreboard pressure would work in their favour. Ebrington's openers both batted well and scored quickly; each retiring after scoring 50. The support cast did well enough to win the game for Ebrington in the final over. Wood bowled well taking 2 for 12 off 4. Oxhill's poor fielding was largely to blame for the loss. No fewer than 6 catches were put down. The Oxhill boys will have to wait another year for their first victory against Yubby.






