HOMITY PIE

Continuing last month's wartime theme, this recipe was originally devised by Land Girls working on farms in the Midlands during the Second World War. At one point, the cheese ration was only 1 oz per week, but this recipe is definitely not the original wartime version, as there is plenty of cheese and a bit of cream. It is made using wholemeal pastry, but standard shortcrust would work too. For ease of slicing, I made it in a narrow rectangular flan tin, but it can be made in a regular round tin. It tastes much better than the sum of its ingredients! We served it at the VE Day 80 Beacon Supper and it was so well received, I even had requests for the recipe, so here goes.

Ingredients

Pastry:

4 oz / 100g plain flour
2 oz / 50g wholemeal flour
¼ tsp salt
3 oz / 75g butter or hard margarine
1 egg yolk
1 tbsp cold water

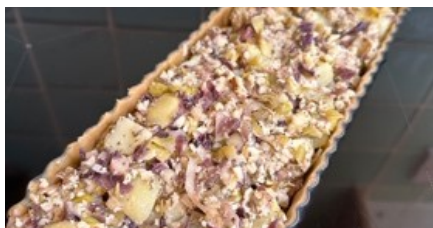
Filling:

12 oz / 350g waxy potatoes eg Charlotte (I used Vivaldi which worked fine)
½ oz / 10g butter
1 tbsp vegetable oil
2 onions, sliced (I used red as that's what we had grown)
2 leeks, sliced
1 garlic clove, finely chopped

6 oz / 175g Cheddar cheese
1 tbsp chopped parsley
1 tbsp thyme
1 tbsp double cream
3 tbsp breadcrumbs
1 ½ tbsp grated Parmesan
Salt and pepper

An 8" / 20cm round tart tin or sandwich cake tin, about 1 ½" / 4cm deep, preferably loose-bottomed

1. Make the pastry by putting the flours and salt into a bowl, add the butter and rub in until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs. Add the egg yolk and the water and mix until the dough begins to stick together. Knead gently until it forms a smooth ball. Wrap in cling and refrigerate for at least 30 minutes, while you make the filling.
2. Peel the potatoes and cut into ¾" (2cm) chunks. Cook in salted boiling water until tender and leave to cool (mine took 10 minutes).
3. Heat the oil and butter in a large frying pan, then add the onions and leeks with a pinch of salt and cook gently until soft. Stir in the garlic and remove from the heat.
4. Place the potatoes in a large bowl, along with the onion and leek mixture. Add the Cheddar, parsley, thyme, cream and seasoning and stir together.
5. Place a baking sheet big enough for your flan dish to stand on inside the oven. Turn the oven on to 200C / Gas 6.
6. Lightly flour the surface and roll out the pastry to fit your tin, about 3mm thick. Line the base and sides of the tin and trim off the excess. Spoon the filling carefully and evenly into the pastry case. Mix the breadcrumbs and Parmesan together and sprinkle over the top.
7. Place the tin on the baking tray in the oven and bake for 40 minutes until the pastry is cooked through and the topping is crisp and golden brown. Remove from the oven and leave to stand for 5-10 minutes before serving. You can also serve it cold if preferred.

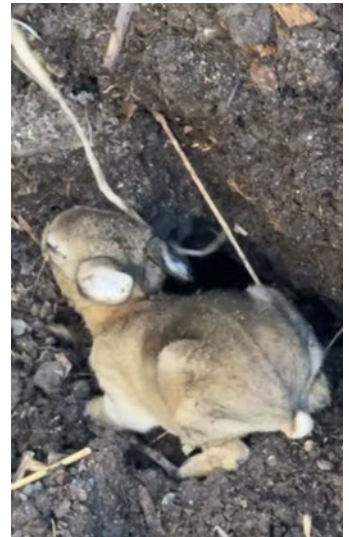
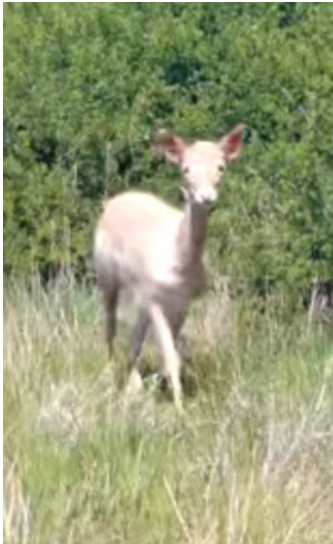

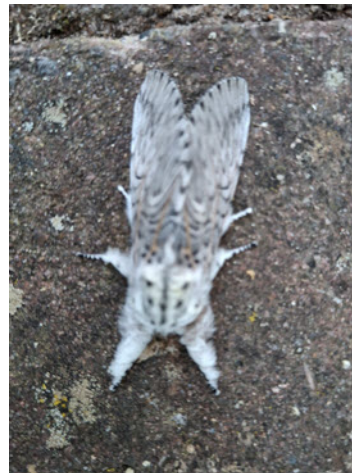

TUSSOCK MOTH

The moth is a pale Tussock Moth seen on the 16th April. Found in bushy or tree - filled places e.g. hedgerows and gardens. The adults emerge in spring and can be seen flying in May and June. Often attracted by lights, with the males sometimes turning up in large numbers. Caterpillars feed on a variety of broad leaved species including blackthorn, hawthorns, hazels crab-apple and birches. They spend the winter as a pupa amongst their feed types of in the leaf litter. Widespread through England and Wales, wingspan 42-62mm.

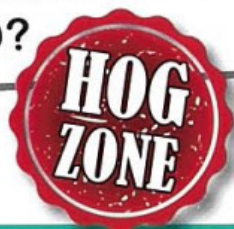

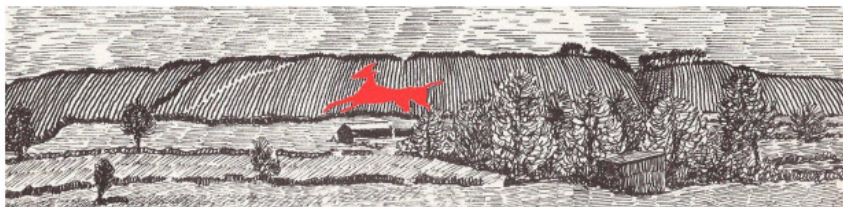

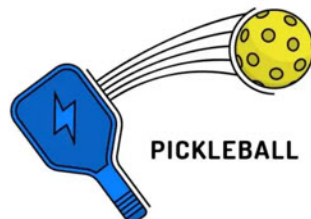
