



ST LAWRENCE CHURCH

March begins with St David's Day, March 1st, and then Pancakes on Shrove Tuesday, March 4th, March 5th being Ash Wednesday which marks the beginning of Lent. In Oxhill we will be celebrating them both together, with a St David's Day Pancake Supper on Saturday, March 1st.

David was a Bishop in the Celtic tradition; he founded several monasteries and lived a very simple life. So, it is not inappropriate that we remember him as we enter the reflective simplicity of Lent. The word 'Shrove' comes from the word 'shrive', meaning forgiven. Lent is a time for reflecting on our lives, for stillness and quiet thought, and saying sorry to God for the ways in which we fail him and each other as we journey towards the events of Holy Week and Easter. The church is stripped of its flowers, and dressed in purple, to signify mourning and penitence – the exception being Mothering Sunday, on March 30th, when we are invited to gather to celebrate the 'Mother Church', and the love of each other.

It is a time for living simply, saying:

God of love and hope and life, at the beginning of Lent we come to you. We come to you seeking forgiveness. We come to you seeking strength for our journey We come to you seeking love. God of love and hope, meet us here. *Ruth Burgess, Spring*



NOTICE OF PLANNED CHANGES TO THE CHURCH INTERIOR

Three years ago, plans were made to improve the facilities inside the church. This was to be completed in three phases. After some delay we have now received Faculty approval from the Diocese to proceed with phase one, which will see the organ relocated to the front of the Nave. This will require the removal of one row of pews on both sides of the Nave aisle. The two current front pews together with the radiators will be moved into the resultant space with the heating pipework adjusted accordingly. Once the pipework is completed a new raised platform will be constructed across the east end of the Nave from the North to South walls and level with the current step. Once the platform is completed and carpeted, the organ will be moved to its new position on the North side of the Nave.

The work is expected to commence at the end of April and should take about 5 weeks. The two specialist contractors we have retained to carry out the works, will be supervised by the church architect, Steven Matthews. Whilst the church will remain open during the work, access will be restricted around the worksite.

The space vacated by the organ will be utilised for refreshments and storage space. Long term plans for phases 2 and 3 would include a Servery in the Nave and provision of a toilet in the Vestry.

We look forward to village support for the long-term plans to bring the facilities of our lovely church up to date.

PUMPKIN CHOCOLATE CHIP BREAD

We started with the cooking pan, made sure to butter and then lightly flour. This will help with removal later. A sieve ensures a lightness and nothing gritty in the cake. We folded the mixture gently together, careful to fully mix the flour but to maintain a little bit of air for fluffiness. We went a bit heavier on the chocolate chips than the recipe suggested, because the chocolate melts slightly through the bread and really makes the taste standout. We did notice that the batter rises quite a bit in the oven, the last time we made this, so this time, we also made a few muffins on the side.

Ingredients

- 1 3/4 cups plain flour
- 1 tsp bicarbonate of soda
- 2 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1/4 tsp ground nutmeg
- 1/4 ground ginger
- 3/4 tsp salt
- 2 large eggs, at room temperature
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 3/4 cup brown sugar
- 1 1/2 cups pumpkin puree (canned or fresh)
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil, canola oil or melted coconut oil
- 1/4 cup orange juice
- 2/3 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips



- 1. Adjust the oven rack to the lower third position and preheat the oven to 180°
- 2. Grease a metal 9x5 inch loaf pan. Set aside.
- 3. In a large bowl whisk the flour, bicarbonate of soda, cinnamon, nutmeg, cloves, ginger and salt together until combined. Set aside.
- 4. In a medium bowl whisk the eggs, sugar and brown sugar together until combined.
- 5. Add the pumpkin, oil and orange juice to the egg mixture.
- 6. Add wet ingredients to dry and gently combine. There will be a few lumps. Do not overmix.
- 7. Gently fold in the chocolate chips.
- 8. Pour the batter into the prepared loaf pan.
- 9. Bake for 60-65 minutes, making sure to loosely cover the bread with aluminium foil halfway to prevent the top from getting too brown.
- 10. The bread is done when a toothpick inserted in the centre comes out clean.
- 11. Cool completely on a wire rack before removing and slicing.

WOT2GROW COMMUNITY ORCHARD

Work in the community orchard has continued throughout January and February despite the cold and wet weather.

Members have been very busy pruning the apple trees. Many trees have been pruned from the top to enable the branches to be more easily reached for picking next autumn, as some had grown quite tall.

The main reasons for pruning are to get better fruit quality (we are not so worried about quantity as there are usually more than enough apples); to let light and air into the trees to ripen the fruit and blow away spores and disease; to keep the trees a smaller size as already

mentioned, and to remove any dead, damaged or diseased

branches.

When pruning a goblet shape is ideally formed, with the trunk being the 'stem' of the goblet. As apple trees fruit on their horizontal branches, the vertical shoots tend to be cut out first.

Membership of the community orchard is open to everyone living in Whatcote, Oxhill, Tysoe and surrounds, and members get fruit every week during the summer and autumn months. Please come and join us!
