The building is the size of a football pitch and is crammed with conveyors and a variety of the latest and fascinating



automatic techniques for sorting our waste into metals, glass and paper. Despite all this there are also more than thirty people employed, many of whom help to sort out the waste by hand. We were all very impressed and now understand better why certain items should not be put in our recycling bins – at one time they found half a horse !

# NOTES OF OXHILL PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY 9th JULY 2013 AT 8.00 PM IN THE VILLAGE HALL

The meeting, chaired by Grenville Moore, was attended by Parish Councillors Carol Taylor, David Hill and Tom Heritage. Apology received from Brian Badger.

## **MATTERS DISCUSSED**

### **Draft Core Strategy**

Carol Taylor gave a report of the progress being made by the parish Plan Steering Committee. Stratford District Council have now published a Draft Core Strategy for the next 20 years identifying Oxhill as a category 4 Local Service Village. This category provides for between 10 – 25 houses.

The Parish Council has registered as a member of so that OS parish maps can be obtained to assist the Steering Committee.

### **Planning**

Application for demolition of existing dwelling and erection of replacement dwelling at “The Maples”, Main Street has been refused mainly on design.

Application for new dwelling at “Ripplesdale”, Green Lane was returned with no objection. Application to crown chestnut tree at The Old Forge was returned with no objection. Outline Planning Application of up to 6 dwellings on land to the rear of “Stablecroft” has been strongly opposed.

### **Finance**

Cheque for £30 paid for internal audit. Cheque for £164.40 (inc. vat) was paid for a Minute Book. The last one was obtained in 1995.

### **Highways**

Matters requested for attention have now been dealt with. One outstanding item is the “Bend” sign on the Tysoe Road which is on order.

### **Dog Fouling**

We would remind all dog owners that it is an offence to allow your dog to foul within the confines of the village. Most dog owners clear up after their pets but some do not including young persons walking dogs. PLEASE CLEAR UP AFTER YOUR DOG.

## LATEST FROM 'OXHILL'S FUTURE – YOUR SAY'

Thank you to everyone who responded to the informal village survey during June and made a comment. There were 22 separate responses. The majority of suggestions came from the suggestion boxes, some were hand delivered and several e-mailed. Most responses commented on several issues.

Following this useful feedback, the Oxhill Parish Plan Steering Group will now begin work on devising questions for a more formal survey form. This will be sent to each household in the parish, along with guidance on completing the form. The form is expected to be distributed during September/October. If you have any suggestions for survey questions please email these to [parish-planning@oxhill.org.uk](mailto:parish-planning@oxhill.org.uk) or post to Sue Hunt, Eudon, Whatcote Road.

Meanwhile, Stratford District Council has published its long-awaited Draft Core Strategy which will shape the development of the district over the next 15 years. You may have read about this in the local paper. The **Housing Target** is 9,500 new dwellings in the strategy period. The majority will be in current urban centres. A **new settlement** is proposed for Gaydon/Lighthorne Heath of 4,800 dwellings, of which 1,900 would be built by 2028. The **Main Rural Centres** will all have allocations, to meet a target of 1,985 in total for these centres.

Meanwhile Oxhill is being designated as a **Local Service Village** (LSV) which are now categorised into four sub divisions. Oxhill is in category 4 (the lowest level) with the expectation that Oxhill will provide between 10 and 25 new homes over the next 15 years. The Full Council were due to formally adopt the Draft Core Strategy at the end of July. It then needs Government approval before full adoption.

## WOT2Grow YOUR Community Orchard

The glorious summer weather has changed things at the orchard!

The grass isn't growing so fast, the plants need water and the fruit is swelling and beginning to ripen. The wild flower trial strips are a picture, especially the corn field annuals, and have been well worth the experiment so we will be planting more wild flower areas now we know it works well.

The sensory garden has established well and in the space of a few weeks the plants have all grown amazingly. We have watered a little but most of the plants were chosen for their ability to survive dry and warm conditions as well as their sensory properties. We just await the bench, bamboo wind chimes and mosaic that the Scout Group will install.

Two bee hives have been set up using nucleus colonies we purchased. There are lots of bees with the "red" queen and the "white" queen so we hope for some honey this year. The bee team are meeting regularly to ensure we keep them happy!

The waterless toilet is on site and just needs the internal fittings installed. We will then erect some trellis fencing so we can grow climbing plants around the entrance. On Sunday Sept 1st from 2:00pm we will be having a "Cream Teas" Open day at the orchard. Come and enjoy an afternoon tea, see the varieties of fruit we are growing and enjoy the beauty of the orchard.

So much is going on and we welcome everyone to come and help with the many aspects of the orchard – just contact one of the team listed below for details of sessions at the orchard. Or just come and take a look!

## TELEPHONE SCAM THAT COULD COST YOU THOUSANDS.

Warwickshire Police has re-issued a warning about a telephone scam, which has already resulted in several people having several thousands of pounds withdrawn from their bank accounts. The advice to anyone being contacted by telephone to advise of problems with direct debit payments is to end the call and contact your bank yourself to check whether there are any problems with bank payments. The scam was first reported to Warwickshire Police in Kenilworth a few weeks ago when one elderly man found £13,800 had been withdrawn from his account. It would appear the same scam has now been used to steal money from elderly people living in Rugby.

The scam involves a cold caller purporting to be from the persons telephone provider saying there is a problem with their direct debit and asking for details of their bank so they can sort it out on their behalf. Another person then calls saying they are from the persons bank reporting there has been fraudulent activity on their account and advising a person from the fraud department would attend their home address and collect their bank card.

They also ask for the PIN number for the card. A short time later an individual presents themselves at the victim's home address saying they are from the bank and have come to collect the card as agreed. The victims have been taken in by this scam have handed over their cards. The addresses are usually visited by a smartly dressed white female, aged in her 30's with dark shoulder length hair.
