WE WILL MISS HIM

Terry spent nearly half his life living in Oxhill after moving into Woodbury on Main Street with Sue and his family in 1979. He was working for Automotive Products in Learnington Spa and remained with them until he retired.

During his nearly forty years living here Terry threw himself into village life in many ways. When a plan was mooted to get the church bells ringing again he joined the construction team hanging the bell-frame from steel joists in the tower roof, removing the old and rotten flooring and replacing it with a new steel support system. Whilst doing this he also joined a group of villagers learning to ring bells so that there would be a team ready to go when the structural work was done. When it was done he duly became one of the band ringing for services. He and Sue joined the Oxhill Walkers, taking Sunday rambles round Warwickshire and nearby parts. He was also a founder member of WOT (Whatcote, Oxhill, Tysoe)Travellers, taking trips on the Shakespeare Express, the Manchester Ship Canal, the Dawlish seawall and the Settle-Carlisle line, to name but a few.

All his life he was a keen gardener, and later joined WOT2Grow, the community orchard in Tysoe, working with other members to keep it in trim and, of course, to harvest the fruit in due season.

Terry and Sue were great supporters of the Village Hall, working behind the scenes and attending and enjoying many functions there. They were also regular Friday evening 'Early Doorsers', first at the Peacock and later the Royal Oak. Terry was a quiet and private man but had a wicked sense of humour. The great esteem in which he was held was shown by the overflowing church at his funeral service.

We will miss him.

Improved heating and new charges for hiring the Village Hall

We are replacing the coin meters used to heat the village hall soon, and installing a programmable system with a thermostat to control the heating. This will mean much improved heating in the hall, which we know can be an issue when it's cold!

With the village hall therefore bearing the cost of electricity in future, the committee has agreed to a modest increase in hiring rates from 1 January 2017, to $\pounds 6.50$ per hour for village events and $\pounds 11.50$ per hour for outside events. These rates will apply throughout the whole of the year.

Oxhill Garden Club

On Thursday 13th October members and friends were introduced via a talk titled *Changing People's Lives* to a charitable organisation that few of us had heard of previously. The Women's Farm and Garden Association (WFGA) was set up in 1899 as a Union to promote the training of 'ladies' in farming and gardening and was instrumental in founding, during World War One, what

became the Women's Land Army. The organisation continues its good work today and provides, amongst other opportunities, places to enable both women and men to gain practical experience in working gardens of good standing such as Highgrove and Chenies Manor. As well as providing work experience for up to 15 hours per week for a year and the chance to learn from experts in the field, the owners of the gardens pay the trainees the current minimum wage, provide tools and arrange insurance cover. The trainee is responsible for their own transport and the submission of a monthly report. There is a two week probation period for both parties' satisfaction before agreements are signed and a £600 registration fee becomes due from the trainee to the charity.

ABOUT WRAGS



The WRAG Scheme (Work and Retrain As a Gardener Scheme) provides hands-on practical horticultural training. The concept is simple. The trainee gardens for 14 hours a week for a year, in a carefully sourced garden...

Our speaker, Vivienne Hayday, in her capacity of Regional Manager is particularly involved in vetting the suitability of owners / working gardens putting themselves forward as potential mentors / places of work for women and men returning to work or changing career; she arranges placements and monitors the learning experience of the trainees. By the end of a year the intention is that those involved in this Work and Retrain as a Gardener Scheme (WRAGS) will be able to actively seek a career in horticulture. Vivienne cited several instances of well paid professionals reassessing their priorities relatively late in life and opting to embrace gardening or a related activity as a fulfilling occupation.

Membership of WFGA costs some £25 per annum with benefits including workshops, practical gardening work days, garden visits and tours. If you are a keen gardener, want to develop your horticultural skills and meet like-minded people, join today at www.wfga.org.uk

Asian Hornet (Vespa velutina)

As you may already know, Asian Hornets have been spotted in the UK this year and made the news http://www.bbc.co.uk/news/uk-england-gloucestershire-37421846 . Smaller than our native, normally gentle, European Hornet (Vespa crabo) this invasive species is, potentially, a serious threat to our pollinators and, ultimately, our UK food chain. The Asian Hornet is not much bigger than a large queen wasp, is dark in colour and has yellow legs.

The Tetbury, Gloucestershire nest has been destroyed, but the expectation is that it is only a matter of time before these pests become much more widespread in the UK. They have been confirmed in Somerset, too, but no nest found; so in October and November hundreds of Queen Asian Hornets may have been released into our countryside. Each one has the potential to create it's own colony next spring. There has been much talk in the press about these Hornets

attacking honey bees; what has not been widely reported is that they are voracious predators of all insects, including butterflies.

An established nest 'ball', invariably hanging high up in a tree, should not be tackled by anyone other than a registered pest control operator. However a simple trap can help destroy queens emerging from their solitary winter nest sites if put out in February and March of next year. Experience in France suggests a 70% reduction in numbers if this method of trapping is widely used. The trap can be made in the kitchen at home from a used plastic bottle; instructions from the National Bee Unit can be found at our Shipston

Matters arising

<u>Parish Council Website</u> – The Parish Council now has a domain name and a website address, <u>http://www.oxhillpc.uk</u>, the website is in the process of being built and items will be added as and when appropriate. We would like to thank Mike Collins for his help in this endeavour.

<u>Leys Field Update</u> – The Newt survey and the archaeological dig are both complete, items found were Roman, Medieval and Neolithic, a County archaeologist is being consulted about further works .

<u>Benches and Planters</u>- Further investigations will be made into low maintenance materials.

<u>Speed of Vehicles</u> – A survey of average speeds through the village taken from sat nav recordings has been obtained along with the cost of monitoring speeds using a radar. Due to the lack of street furniture further investigation needs to be carried out, Transport and Highways will be contacted for more information. They will also be contacted in regard to moving the 30 mile an hour speed limit to beyond current and future dwellings.

<u>Pay Phone Removal</u>- Stratford District Council is proposing to remove pay phones from a number of villages, many of these as the box in Oxhill have not been used during the twelve month monitoring period. The Parish council will return a response to the consultation to remove the phone and box.

<u>Planning</u> – Permission has been granted for: separate driveways for Plots 2 and 3 on the Green Lane

Planning pending – Appeal for 2 detached houses at the rear of Oak woods House, Green Lane. Arboricultural works at Auchneiven House, Whatcote Road.

A dwelling adjacent to Merrydown, Green Lane. Change of use to barns at Harrods Farm and a New dwelling at Hollies, Rouse Lane.

<u>Transparency Fund</u> – The Parish Council has been successful in its application for a grant for equipment to meet the requirements of Transparency legislation, the grant will cover the costs of a computer, scanner, printer, software, costs involved in setting up the website and the clerks wages to set up the website. The total received was £1012.00. The New Website will be complete in the New Year proposed by Derek Harbour and seconded by Duncan Harper. 2016 Review

Ettington Community First Responder Scheme provides emergency medical response to 999 calls in the Stourdene area on a voluntary basis in conjunction with West Midlands Ambulance Service. The Scheme receives no government funding and relies on fundraising and donations to provide the equipment carried by the Community First Responders (CFRs) which includes a defibrillator. None of our team – medical or support – receive any payment for their services. If you'd like to know more, please visit our website and social media feeds where we have lots more information.

Operational

Since our launch in 2009, we've been called to 813 incidents. At the time of writing, we're seeing a particularly busy period with 24 incidents attended during the month of October alone. WMAS is upgrading its qualifications requirements for CFRs so the 6 CFRs in our team will soon be commencing a new training regime involving further exams and practical assessments.

Goodbyes and Hellos

During 2016 we have been sorry to say goodbye to CFRs Derrick and Alison. Derrick joined as a CFR soon after the Scheme was launched and served the community for nearly 7 years. Alison has been our Scheme Coordinator for 4 years as well as qualifying as a CFR in 2015. We were also sorry to lose the support of Lauren who had been helping organise our fundraising events as Communications Officer. On a happier note we have been pleased to welcome James as our newest CFR. James lives in Kineton so extends our coverage to the south-east of Ettington.

Scheme Car

The car, which has entered its fifth year in our service, plays a fundamental role in our operation; with Ambulance Service radio and high visibility markings it helps us maintain contact with the Emergency Operations Centre and helps the following ambulance crew immediately know that they have arrived at the right place. We have also received comment that simply seeing it provides reassurance that we exist; helping to save life in our communities. It is now approaching 13 years old and having stretched another year's service out of it beyond what we planned, the wheels of replacement are now in hand. If you work in the motor trade and are able to help us secure a cost-effective deal we'd love to hear from you.

Fundraising

2016 has been another big year for fundraising. Our main event for the year was a talk given by Ettingtonbased Polar Explorer Mark Wood in June. An audience of well over one hundred enjoyed a very interesting and entertaining talk which raised nearly £1.000. We would like to thank Mark for giving his time and Ettington Chase for providing their superb venue free of charge as well as giving much help organising and promoting the event. The Ettington Village Breakfast as usual provided a welcome boost to our funds. We were also delighted to be chosen as Valpak's nominated charity. And of course there have been many individual donations as well as income from our charity boxes, and you may have spotted our car and volunteers at other events in the villages around our patch. We'd like to thank everyone who has helped, participated or donated to us during the last 12 months.

Communication

Whilst it consumes a lot of amount of our time on top of everything else, we strive to keep regular communications with the communities that we serve. This includes the provision of updates at Parish Council meetings and other Parish events.
