NOTES OF OXHILL PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY 13th JANUARY 2015 AT 8.00 PM IN THE VILLAGE HALL

The meeting, chaired by Grenville Moore, was attended by Parish Councillors Carol Taylor, Tom Heritage and David Hill and one member of the public. Apology received from Brian Badger.

MATTERS DISCUSSED

Highways- Heavy lorries through the village

We have been informed by W.C.C. Traffic Projects Group that HGV's are permitted to use any classification of road for access and deliveries even if a weight restriction is in place (unless it is a structural weight limit).

<u>Parish Plan</u>

Six points are identified for action by the Parish Council:

1) Support for the elderly – to be pursued

2) Access to a range of activities for young people – to be pursued

3) Concerns of flooding. We will contact Severn Trent for a meeting to discuss what steps can be taken to reduce the risk of potential or actual flooding.

4) Speed limits. We have already been advised that community radar equipment is available, free of charge, for monitoring speed which provides information on the extent and severity of the problem. This requires 7 volunteers who will be trained in the use of the equipment. IF YOU WOULD LIKE TO VOLUNTEER FOR THIS PROJECT PLEASE CONTACT ME on 680441

5) Parking on pavements. We have no real ongoing enforcement available, i.e. police presence, yellow lines, but it is our responsibility to abide by the law and not park across the pavement thereby respecting the safety of those who walk, push prams, or use mobility aids to safely use the pavements and not have to go into road. The main area of concern is the top of Beech Road by the flower trough. The parking in this area makes it difficult for drivers to see on coming traffic.

6) **Dog fouling**. This has been brought to every ones attention on many occasions. It is a question of thinking of others. If your dog fouls the pavement or open spaces used by others then it is your responsibility to clean up after your pet. The Parish Council can provide bins for this use but would you like a dog waste bin outside your house?

Finance – Precept 2015/2016

Expenditure for the above period was discussed and a balance sheet provided of present and future expenditure. $\pounds500$ would be allowed for insurance, audit fees, Clerk's honorarium and expenses, membership of WALC; grants towards mowing the churchyard and Village Hall ground of $\pounds600$ and $\pounds200$ respectively; support would continue for the Oxhill News at $\pounds768$ pa. Elections will be held in May for District and Parish Councils, provision has to be made in the event that Oxhill will hold an election, i.e. if more than 5 people stand for Parish Councillor. The cost of this will be in the region of $\pounds700$. If no election is needed the cost is $\pounds100$. We brought forward $\pounds993$, therefore a precept of $\pounds2500$ was agreed by the meeting.

<u>Planning</u>

Outline planning for up to 4 dwellings on land to the rear of "Stablecroft" was returned with objection to backland infill on agricultural land and in contravention of our main planning principles set out in the Parish Plan. This application has now been refused.

Planning applications for i) outline planning for one dwelling at "Merrydown" and ii) construction of detached dwelling on land off Green Lane. Both these application were supported in line with the Parish Plan.

Permission was granted for single storey side extension with roof space at "Clermont"

Application to upgrade and underground 14 span of low voltage cable by Western Power was granted.

<u>Footpaths</u>

The footpath from Beech Road to Gilks Lane, which runs behind the houses on Main Street is blocked and needs opening up as a right of way. Highways to be notified.

PARISH ACTION PLAN

As you will have read, the Action Plan was addressed by the Parish Council at the last meeting. There are eight 'value statements' that require action to be taken and some require more input than the parish council can achieve alone.

- 1) Support for the elderly needs the formation of a working group. We need volunteers.
- 2) Access a range of activities for young people again needs the formation of a working group and again volunteers needed.

Perhaps one working group could address both the above? Just a suggestion.

- 3) To retain close connection with the countryside OWLS has already undertaken and will continue to support this criteria. If you would like to join OWLS, please contact me.
- 4) Flooding the Parish Council will be contacting Severn Trent Water to start with and will liaise with affected residents.
- 5) Development/Planning in Oxhill now we have a Parish Plan, which the Parish Council can use to support planning issues.
- 6) Oxhill residents want people to behave responsibly there are several points to be addressed here and as you can see from the Parish Council minutes, these were discussed in some detail.

a) Speeding – we do require seven volunteers to train in the use of a community camera. Mick Shepard will co-ordinate this, but initially application forms can be obtained from Angela Kean -680441.

b) Parking – this is quite a difficult one in a small village. While it is accepted that when there is a function in the Old Chapel, cars will have to park partly on the pavement, we have had complaints that some vehicles have been parking fully on the pavement by the telephone box, obstructing visibility, which is another matter. Persistent offenders will have their vehicle photographed and sent to the Police. It really is just a matter of being considerate and 'think before you park'.

c) Dog fouling – again think of YOUR responsibility. Part of the problem seems to be that occasionally younger residents of the village, when walking the family dog, ignore the fact that their dog has just fouled the pavement. Please make sure your children take the 'poo bags' with them.

- 7) Broadband Mike Collins is monitoring this one for us at the moment.
- 8) Oxhill residents should be well informed We have the Oxhill News and two notice boards, so it is difficult to see what more we can do. I think those of us on the Parish Council, village hall committee and PCC just need to look at how if possible we can give out more information – perhaps an information booklet to every house or a village website. Do we have a volunteer to look at putting something like this together?

OXHILL GARDEN CLUB

On January 15th Anne Chambers, owner and gardener, took us through a year at Kiftsgate Court gardens. Set on the edge of the Cotswold escarpment near Chipping Campden, the gardens are the creation of three generations of women gardeners. Anne's grandmother first designed and planted a series of interconnecting gardens each with its distinct character in the 1920s and we were treated to a slide show that included many of her original plantings still thriving almost one hundred years on. Anne's mother continued the development of the gardens and introduced new plant and shrub varieties particularly suited to the different micro-climates found in the different parts of the six acre estate.

Anne and her husband are building on their inheritance and spend most mornings working in the gardens (with a little hired help!) before the visitors arrive in the middle of the day Saturday through to Wednesday, April to September. There is always work to be done keeping the grounds immaculate, pruning as necessary and filling in for natural die back. Whereas the drifts of snowdrops and daffodils are self-seeding despite the ground being returned to mowed lawn later in the year, the dense plantings of tulips need to have several hundred bulbs of the same varieties added to maintain the glorious annual showings.

Anne's enthusiasm was lovely to see and her horticultural knowledge such that she not only had the name of each and every plant at her (very green) fingertips but could also recount its history. The most notable, the famous Kiftsgate rose (Rosa filipes 'Kiftsgate'), is a vigourous thorny climber and reckoned to be the largest in England. It takes up half the space on one side of the Rose Border and three trees have been smothered by its spreading habit. We were shown a spectacular slide of it covered in panicles of white blooms resembling a cascading July waterfall amongst the trees.

The consensus of those present at the talk, whether or not they had visited Kiftsgate before, was that the committee should arrange a trip there later in the year. Watch this space! The next Garden Club meeting (always the third Thursday in the month) is on 19th February, is a talk by Philip Aubrey on 'The History of the Birmingham Botanical Gardens', and is when we look forward to a social gathering of friends old and new.
