PARISH NOTES FOR FEBRUARY

On February 2nd, we celebrate Candlemas; this ancient Festival marks the time when the very elderly Simeon encountered the infant Jesus in the Temple, and realised that in this child lay God's plan for rescuing and restoring his people. That rescue was to involve dying on a cross, hence in that child we see both the crib, when Jesus was born to live among us, and the cross, when Jesus will die for us. Candlemas invites us to turn our attention away from the crib and look to the cross. We are invited to put the celebration of Christmas behind us, and start looking towards the mysteries of Easter.

For many people, therefore, this is the time when Christmas decorations are finally put away. It is also the time when church candles were blessed, and in some cases given out to people to light their homes – hence the name.

So this month sees us finally packing away the Christmas things, and beginning to plan for Shrove Tuesday and the beginning of Lent on Ash Wednesday, which this year are 28th February and 1st March respectively.

Minutes of a meeting of Oxhill Parish Council held on Tuesday 10th January at 8.00pm in the Village Hall.

The meeting, chaired by Grenville Moore and was attended by Councillors Duncan Harper, Stuart Whittaker and Derek Harbour and Sue Hunt. Five members of the public attended.

Minutes – Minutes of the previous meeting were read, agreed and signed.

Matters arising

Parish Council Website – The website is gradually building, after this audit round at the end of this financial year, most Parish Councils will not need external audit from 2017-18 onwards. It is therefore important that the financial information required by the transparency Code is available on a website therefore we need to ensure that we have the facilities to comply with that. The Government are likely to be making spot checks after this point to ensure that small councils are complying.

Leys Field Update – The plans and house designs have been distributed to interested parties. It was proposed by Grenville Moore and seconded by Derek Harbour that there was an opportunity for an open discussion at the end of the meeting in order for comments from both the Parish Council and members of the public to be raised and to the appropriate person from Sandgate developments.

Benches and Planters- In discussion with users of the bus stop the desire for a shelter has been raised as the removal of the phone box will leave people exposed to the elements whilst waiting for the bus. It was also discussed whether this would be a suitable location for the defibrillator – further investigations will be carried out.

Planning – Permission has been granted for: 2 detached houses and the demolition of the garage at Oakwoods House, Green Lane.

Planning pending – Arboricultural works at Auchneiven House, Whatcote Road. A dwelling adjacent to Merrydown, Green Lane. Change of use to barns at Harrods Farm and a new dwelling at Hollies, Rouse Lane. Landscaping and reserved matters at Stablecroft, Green Lane.

Planning withdrawn – A new dwelling at the Homestead, Main Street.

Finance

Transparency Fund –Permission was given for the clerk to purchase of the equipment as funded by the Transparency Fund Proposed by Duncan Harper and Seconded by Derek Harbour.

Precept – Due to an increase in costs during the year 2016-2017 it was decided to increase the amount requested through the precept to £3000 to cover these costs. Proposed by Grenville Moore and seconded by Sue Hunt.

Payments- A payment of £377.90 was made for the printing of the Oxhill News from April to September. A contribution of £200 was made towards the cost of moving the village hall.

Any other Business

It was raised that a resident they were concerned that restoration works to land outside their property after electrical works was not completed to a satisfactory standard. Having reviewed the situation the Parish Council considered that it would not be possible to improve the situation further.

Speeding – Councillor Seccombe will be contacted again to see if funding can be secured to move the 30 mile an hour signs. Stratford District Council will be contacted in order to establish the cost of the works.

Oxhill Garden Club

On the evening of Thursday 12th January, by means of some wonderful slides, members were taken on a trip to the world famous sub-tropical Tresco Abbey Gardens by a knowledgeable and entertaining speaker David Brazier who stepped in at the eleventh hour when the scheduled speaker fell ill. David is a Trustee of the Studley College Trust which awards grants amounting to some hundred thousand pounds a year to agricultural students. When the Studley Horticultural & Agricultural College for Women closed in 1969 the assets were used to found the Trust, and David's involvement each year has been to oversee the placement of three particular students at a stage of their career when a year's funded experience on Tresco would be of most benefit.

Tresco Abbey Garden was established by the 19th Century proprietor of the islands, Augustus Smith, originally as a private garden to the home that he designed and built within the old Abbey grounds. To provide shelter for the exotic flora in his garden, Augustus planted trees - latterly Monterey cypress and Monterey pine which are fast growing and suited to coastal conditions.

The island shrugs off salt spray and Atlantic gales to host a myriad of exotic plants, many of which would stand no chance of survival even on the Cornish mainland less than 30 miles away. The tropical garden is home to more than 20,000 species of plants from 80 countries, ranging from Brazil to New Zealand and Burma to South Africa. Even at the winter solstice there are more than 300 plants in flower.

TYSOE CHURCH OF ENGLAND PRIMARY SCHOOL

The New Year started with a topical focus on ways to keep healthy, with a particular emphasis on the Science aspects of diet, exercise and leisure activities. Surprising facts investigated by the children include the amount of sugar in popular fizzy drinks and how these also can damage your teeth. As part of this emphasis on food, the School Council met with the Catering Managers to consider changes to the menu and feedback about the meals. The children were very honest in their comments and also provided helpful suggestions to improve the service.

The Sports Premium Funding has enabled a lunchtime activity club, coaching support in gymnastics and an after-school dance club. Peripatetic teachers offer lessons in a range of musical instruments, football and French. Exciting events for the term have already been booked. These include a poetry and music event to introduce a poetry week. Teachers have also arranged a wide variety of trips. Different classes will visit the British Museum to study the Ancient Greeks, Chedworth Roman Villa, Herbert Art Gallery and Coventry Cathedral, and Warwick Castle. The historical theme continues with a planned Viking Invasion in school, with the opportunity for children to dress up! Lots of hands-on experiences to promote good learning!

WOT2Grow Community Orchard

A quiet month at the orchard after the festive season but at least the pruning has been started and it is really interesting to see the different ways the varieties of apples and pears grow. Some of the trees are very upright and strong whilst others have a more relaxed way of growing!

The blueberry raised beds have been constructed and lined with plastic with drainage holes. However we are still awaiting the correct soil with which to fill them, it needs to be acidic with a ph between 4.5 and 5.0. When this arrives we will be ready to plant up several different varieties to extend the fruiting season.

So we will carry on pruning and tidying up over the coming month whilst we wait for the warmer weather! After the mild winter so far the buds are forming and swelling fast so we hope that it doesn't turn too cold for too long. Then we can start to think about feeding and doing the initial organic sprays to help with keeping the bugs and diseases at bay.
