The beginning of February sees Candlemas, when we take one last look at Christmas, then turn to face Easter. To mark it, St. George's Church, Brailes, is hosting a Royal School of Church Music '**Come and Sing' Candlemas Eucharist on Saturday, February 3rd**. OXHILL GARDEN CLUB

On Thursday 11th January, Garden Club members were privileged to have Pauline Pears, founder member of Garden Organic and author of several books on the subject, talk to us about her approach to making the best use of the soil and growing conditions that we as potential vegetable growers are faced with. The five vegetables she would recommend for all (or most) year round supply were: potatoes, beans, pumpkins, leeks and chard. But she has a light sandy soil and we, with our heavy clay, might find other vegetable crops do better.

Pauline's 'Desert Island' choices were coloured by what best suited her allotment, ease of growing, good cropping, disease resistance, an extended growing season or her ability to store the produce. Apart from helping seedlings on their way, she never feels the need to water. Her 'luxury' was tomatoes.

We were treated to slides of the varieties Pauline had tried over the years: potatoes with skins all colours of the rainbow, largely blight resistant and which could be left in the ground until wanted; leeks that she sowed as seed in trays and 'detached' from their initial roots for transplanting; beans from her own dried seed with the caveat that they readily hybridised; pumpkins with good flavour and which could be planted in odd spots to act as ground cover / weed suppressors; chard with leaves that had more body than spinach and stalks that needed to be cooked separately.

To encourage those present to get planting and rich, and so that no-one had to sell the family cow, Pauline gave out some special beans. Fee Fi Fo Fum!.

The Garden Club committee particularly extends invitations to newcomers to the village and surrounding settlements. We look forward to seeing faces old and new at the next meeting (usually the second Thursday in the month) on February 15th for ‘An Evening with Ken Whittaker’. Ken is a horticulturalist and florist with amusing anecdotes on the dos and don’ts of seasonal gardening; he is experienced in the field of Social and Therapeutic Horticulture.

Please note that our AGM is on the fourth Thursday of March – the 22nd. Confused? Don’t be – our soon to be published 2017/8 programme will be back on track and comprise a cornucopia of delights to educate, enlighten and inform. Arrive 7.00pm for a 7.30 start after a social glass of wine should you so desire.

MINUTES OF A MEETING OF OXHILL PARISH COUNCIL HELD ON TUESDAY 9th JANUARY AT 8.00PM IN THE VILLAGE HALL.

The meeting, chaired by Grenville Moore was attended by Councillor Duncan Harper, apologies were received from Sue Hunt and Derek Harbour. Councillor John Fielding, and Councillor Chris Williams Members for Kineton & Red Horse Division also attended.

Minutes – Minutes of the previous meeting were read, agreed and signed.

Matters arising

Speeding radar- The speeding survey has been carried out, no results have been received to date.

Footpath Bridge – The hole in the bridge has been repaired, further works may need to be carried out to ensure the bridge is functional in the long term.

Code of Conduct – A decision was deferred until the next meeting.

Planning – Permission has been approved for: Change of use of existing livery yard, Church Farm.

Planning pending: Land adjacent to Oxbourne House and Applegrove.
Planning refused : Land off Church Lane.

Precept – An extraordinary meeting will be held on 20th January 2018 to determine this.

Any other Business

Plot 3 Green Lane – A letter has been sent to Stratford Planning department by a member of the community raising concerns about the development on Green Lane including the positioning of the new dwellings, boundaries and therefore the validity of the planning applications. A letter will be sent to the planning office in support of the matters raised, Councillor John Fielding will liaise with the appropriate people.

Pot holes – There have been reports of several pot holes around the village, the Pot hole hot line will be notified.

Phone Box removal- The appropriate department will be contacted to ascertain a date for the removal.

Report by Councillor John Fielding– A report was given by Councillor Fielding identifying that the Judicial review for the Hornton Hospital was unsuccessful therefore previously proposed changes will take place as planned. There will be an increase in the Council Tax for the new financial year, however, the large number of houses that have been built across the district has reduced the increase.

Report by Councillor Chris Williams – The review of the Children’s Centres has been completed, saving from building and reviewing services will be made. The budget will be set on the 8th February when more details about the increases to Council Taxes will be available.

There being no other business the meeting closed at 8.55 pm. Date of the next meeting 13th March 8.00pm in the Village Hall.

Precept – Due to rising costs and greater demands on the Parish Council the precept for the financial year 2018 /2019 will be set at £8,400. Proposed by Derek Harbour and Seconded by Duncan Harper and Stuart Whittaker.

WOT2GROW COMMUNITY ORCHARD



More snow, ice and disruption in December and therefore loss of time at the orchard doing maintenance!

However we started pruning the apples and pears mid January in order to get them completed by the end of the month. With the cider apples and perry pears also ready for a prune there was plenty to do! It is interesting to see the different rates of growth of the trees, some are getting big with strong growth and others are languishing with weaker growth. They have all been treated the same apart from the pruning so maybe that is where the answer lies.

We also pruned the nut trees, walnuts, hazel and filbert, which are looking very big and strong.

Preparation for the Wassail centred around the gathering of material for the BIG bonfire! Our fire master (David Sewell!) did a valiant job in collecting material and we had quite a few Christmas trees to add to the wood from the orchard itself. What better way to recycle real trees!



The demise of the Joan J autumn raspberries has been mourned by many at the orchard! The area has now been cleared and leaves a large patch for us to consider what we do next. No raspberries but maybe other fruits!

Other clearing of mainly weeds continues and hopefully it won't be long before we are looking to feeding and mulching, spraying and cleaning and generally welcoming the warmer weather as spring approaches!

Do come along to see us, maybe help out, and enjoy your community orchard behind the allotments along the Shenington Road in Tysoe! Why not join us and enjoy the fruit we grow.


