ROAD SAFETY AND SPEEDING IN OXHILL

The increase in traffic and noticeable speeding in recent years has resulted in greater attention by the Parish Council and some recent actions to try to alleviate the situation.

Past actions

Community speed camera

In May 2016, a small group of villagers took part in this project.

Because of the signage and presence of the camera crew, the results showed that only 3.8% of drivers were over the limit, far from the true picture.

To make any significant difference the camera team would have to be constantly monitoring traffic.

Further speed checking.

Further checking was requested by the PC and over a two day period later in the year, speed monitoring via rubber strips in Green Lane and Whatcote Road were installed by the Council at a cost to the PC and speeds were checked again. Results showed, again, that the average speeds were 33 and 34 mph BUT there were also a number of vehicles that exceeded 60 mph.

Road marking

Discussions with Warwickshire Highways Department (WHD) resulted in the recent road marking with 'Dragons Teeth' and 30 mph surface signage throughout the village. The real effectiveness of this is difficult to measure.

Future potential action

WHD advise that nothing makes a significant change apart from physical restraints such as chicanes or speed humps. However, as a 'dark' village (ie one with no street lights) – Chicanes and Road Bumps are not permitted for safety reasons.

Other conventional methods such as village gates, more signage, and flashing signs have been considered but currently rejected on grounds of cost effectiveness.

Unconventional methods such as making Oxhill a one-way system, roadside placards, and dummy policemen have also been considered.

Physical barriers.

It has been suggested by Highways staff that parking cars in the road to form a chicane would be effective and this final suggestion has been the subject of further research by your PC.

Assuming that residents would be unwilling to park their cars on the road, night or day, one option would be to purchase two cars and equip them with satisfactory night time lighting, and front and back recording cameras. These cars could be moved to wherever was required.

A second, and much cheaper but also potentially as effective scheme is to use **trailers** instead of cars. Simple second-hand box trailers would be equipped with night time lighting, similar to cars, and would be locked in position where required to prevent theft. An amber light could be fitted at some height to emphasise the existence and a front and rear camera would record any collision.. This concept has been tested on-line by 'Ask the police' and it appears that it could be feasible and legal.

Funding

The parish council has approved funding for this concept which now needs further detailed considerations.

Action now

Since this scheme will be able cover all roads around our village, to progress this, we need to form a committee of helpers, of enthusiastic people with ideas, legal experience and practical skills. If you would like to be involved, please contact me.

PRECIS OF PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD 3RD DECEMBER 2019

Co-option of New Councillor

Reuben Connolly was welcomed and co-opted onto the Parish Council.

Minutes of last meeting held on 10th September 2019

These were approved and signed.

To receive a report from the County and District Councillor

Cllr Feilding noted there is little going on due to purdah and the General Election on 12th December. He has received contact details for an ORBIT propertiy agent. Non UK residents will need to have legal immigration status to continue to live in the UK after Brexit. They have to register by 2021. Cllr Feilding to forward the details for the newsletter and website. Details of two community transport schemes were handed over, UBUS and VASA. To use VASA, the volunteer driver is paid 45p per mile and a £3 admin fee. Two hours of waiting time is included in the booking.

To discuss the drainage in Leys Field

There have been flooding problems following the heavy rainfall recently. A letter has been drafted and will be sent to Stratford District Council.

To receive an update on Traffic Calming

Cllr Rivers-Fletcher had circulated a paper. Speeding continues to be a problem but measures are limited without street lighting. An idea of lit up box trailers is being explored. It was agreed to allocate £1K to this project.

A grant request had been received from Oxhill Village Hall to help with renovations costs. This is the first request for money from them. It was agreed to ask for more information about total planning costs and more detail of ongoing expenses and fees.

To review the current budget and forecast to 31st March 2020 The current budget sheet was reviewed. The Parish Council are currently working to budget.

To look at Income, Expenditure and Plans for 2020/21 Ideas for plans and expenditure for the coming year include:

- Bench outside the church with a nameplate
- Purchase and installation of mobile chicanes to help with speed reduction
- More waste/dog bins located around the village
- Three new bus shelters on a 1 per year basis
- More proactive stance on flooding to include short term measures like acquiriing a stock of sandbags and longer term actions of persuing the relevant authorities

- Review of documentation provided to new residents to potentially include a footpath map
- Small lockable filing cabinet for PC documents in the village hall
- Frequent updating of the village on security matters
- Assets of Community Value to be registered
- Review of Green credentials including piloting a collective scheme for solar panels on roofs of houses, a charging point for electric vehicles and the planting of wild flowers on the verges

These ideas and costs will form part of the budget discussions at the next meeting in January.
