NATURE NOTES FOR JULY 2018

'Rest is not idleness, and to lie sometimes on the grass under trees on a summer's day, listening to the murmur of the water, or watching the clouds float across the sky, is by no means a waste of time' - John Lubbock

Now here's a rare thing, for a couple of days in June we had a young white house sparrow in our garden with a small flock of about eight young birds. These are rare sightings with only a few being recorded throughout the country each year. This colouration is caused by a condition known as leucism which affects the pigmentation in the feathers, but unlike albinism it does not turn the eye pink.



I managed to get a couple of photos of this bird, but it seemed to have disappeared after a couple of days. I suspect because it didn't have the same camouflage characteristics as the other birds it would be prone to predation. The house sparrow or 'spadger' is now on the endangered list – hard to believe they were once so common that rewards were offered for the most birds culled, and sparrow pie was a common rural dish in Britain up to the First world War. A stuffed sparrow killed

by Indian cricketer Jehangir Khan whilst bowling at Lords in 1936 is still on display, mounted on the ball that killed it!

The other day I came through the bottom gate from the Kineton road into the field behind the Manor and as I entered I saw what I assumed to be a large black plastic bag windmilling in the wind across the ground. I made my way towards it with the intention of picking it up, but as I got within about 20 metres it parted, and up flew a buzzard and a heron. They had been fighting over a rabbit carcass, a very unusual and rare thing to witness. The heron could easily have killed the buzzard with a single thrust of its beak and the buzzard's talons could have inflicted great damage to the heron, but as they flew off, both appeared completely unhurt.

A first for Oxhill, at a location within the parish, last year and again this year, there are a few bee orchids (*Ophrys apifra*) flowering.



The flower's velvety lips looks like a female bee, and males fly to it and end up pollinating the flower, or that's the idea, but the right bee species doesn't live in the UK and so this orchid is self-pollinating. It is not common, but can be found in June to July throughout the UK, but is scarce in the north.

July 1670, not far from Cirencester was an Apparition: being demanded whether a good Spirit or bad? returned no answer, but disappeared with a curious Perfume and most melodious Twang. Mr W Lilly believes it was a Fairy' – John Aubrey, Miscellanies 1695.

I would bet Mr Lilly was wending his way home from the Ale House!

PROOF DEATH IS NOT THE END OF LIFE

Science recently discovered what Jesus taught more than two thousand years ago.

Science has discovered that butterflies can remember their caterpillar lives, even though their bodies decompose completely inside their cocoons.

Everything about the two phases of the insect are utterly different – their body types, their diets and the clumsy caterpillar crawls on leaves while the elegant butterfly flits from flower to flower.

Dr. Martha Weiss of Georgetown University in Washington, DC, said, “We were curious to see if we could train a caterpillar to do something it could remember as a butterfly.”


They gave electric shocks to caterpillars when exposing the caterpillars to the scent of a chemical often used in nail polish remover (ethyl acetate). After the caterpillars had completely decomposed in their cocoons and emerged as butterflies, they avoided the scent that was used on them when they were electrocuted as caterpillars.

“During metamorphosis the caterpillar turns to soup and all the ingredients are rearranged into the butterfly,” said Dr Weiss. “Yet memories to persist through decomposition.”

Science is not knowledgeable about the process of death, but it does recognise that putrefaction, a very unpleasant and smelly procedure, that reduces a body to soup is not the end of life, rather it produces new life. Out of the decomposed remains of a caterpillar emerges a soaring butterfly. Decomposition is a new beginning.

The process of decomposition in a caterpillar is the same as the process of decomposition of any other life form, including humans. The caterpillar decomposes in a cocoon and humans decompose in the ground. The butterfly that emerges from the cocoon remembers its life as a caterpillar. Why would it be any different for a human?

Delighted to let you know that the hedgehogs have been back in force since late April/early May. Many regular hedgehogs visit my garden each night, some make a second visit in the early hours. It can become quite crowded (in hedgehog terms) on occasions. Three or even four at the same time visit the food bowls and then the fun begins. I am quite surprised that such an apparently cute animal can be quite aggressive when meeting 'rivals'. There is a lot of snuffling, barging, and quite hard headbutting going on. But the victim does not give in, lowering its head and curling up but it still stands its ground, much to the annoyance of the aggressor. It is apparent that there is one hedgehog who appears to think my patio is solely his territory and comes back several times during the night. He spends quite a long time snuffling in the food bowls, drinking and even, I think, having a nap in the hedgehog box. He is very aggressive if he finds another hedgehog there.

Please keep feeding them all through the summer as come August to October they need to put on as much weight as possible to get through the winter. So if they are well fed in the summer it will not be such a critical task for them during the autumn when it is harder for them to find the insects, slugs and worms to feast on. UPDATE ON CHURCHYARD



As you all probably know, we have a wildlife area in the churchyard. We thought you might like to know our thoughts and plans for the area and we would be happy to have any comments.

We have divided the space into roughly four parts:

- a) Between the fence and first line of gravestones
- b) Between these gravestones and the next
- c) Along the top edge
- d) Between the road and our boundary which includes the horse chestnut trees.

Areas (a) and (d) are being left pretty much to go wild to see what happens but this management may change depending on the outcome. There are many ant heaps in (a) and there is a lot of meadow vetchling which, though it strangles other plants, is attractive to common blue butterflies. Area (d) is mainly in the shade of the trees so will encourage different plants. There is a large patch of violets at the back by the wall which looked lovely in the Spring.

Areas (b) and (c) are slowly being cleared and planted where necessary. Our aim is to grow mostly wild flowers that are native to Warwickshire though we have made exceptions where a plant is particularly attractive to bees and other insects. There are already clumps of knapweed, sorrel and meadow buttercups which we are encouraging by keeping them clear of dominant grasses and other thuggish plants! We have added to the cowslips planted by Carol B and put in meadow cranesbill, mallows, primroses, red campion, ragged robin, oxeye daisies and others. Nadia donated some fox and cubs and Nial some tuberous comfrey which we have put in the far corner next to the common comfrey where it can grow unchecked at least for the time being.

At present we are planting in patches and drifts so that we are able to keep down the aggressive species around them but we are hoping eventually the whole area will be full of wildflowers. This may need some imagination at the moment though we are getting there. We are also hoping to keep a pathway clear so that you can wander through the flowers. If you do that at present please be very aware of what you are treading on but it is lovely to do so with the emergence of the damsel flies, butterflies and other insects.

If anyone else is up for this please let us know and certainly come and encourage them! We will provide hot toddies and mince pies for those who complete the challenge (and maybe those who cheer them on too!)

For those of you with properties bordering the walk we are happy for you to access the walk from your gardens. We have been overwhelmed and thank you for the warm welcome we have received from all "Oxhillians" and very much hope you will enjoy this walk!

It is difficult to keep on top of the grass but our team of mowers, plus our essential man with a scythe, have done a great job. It is not meant to be a lawn but an orchard full of wild life which helps with local biodiversity. Just go and enjoy the peace, birds and other creatures that are very happy with this orchard that is worked in conjunction with nature rather than against nature! The orchard is open 24/7 so chose your time to visit.

The weather has helped us a lot with lots of rain, warmth and also a cold winter and no late frosts! So we have a good set of most fruit despite our summer and autumn raspberries being in decline due to phytophthera disease which is in the soil and has no remedy.

We have put up fruit cages where possible to protect currants and blueberries and also used netting to protect some of the cherries, hope we get a taste of a few this year!
