DEANERY NEWS, JUNE 2014

Firstly, a huge thank you to all those who supported the Deanery Lent Services through their participation, hospitality and by coming along. For many of you, used to small village churches, I know it was really wonderful to be able to worship together in a large group, and to spend time with each other. Thank you too for your generosity: including Gift Aid, we were able to send £1200 to Urban Hope, to support their work in the centre of Coventry, which is marvellous.

The next Deanery Synod is on Tuesday, 24th June, at 7.30pm at Newbold Church. We shall be welcoming James Kerr to talk about the work of the Historic Churches Trust – many of you have probably taken part in their annual bike ride. We shall also be welcoming newly elected members of Synod, and re-electing the Deanery Standing Committee. All are welcome to hear James: you do not have to be a member of Synod to come along and listen (and share a cup of coffee and a biscuit with us).

I have spent the last two Saturdays at events to celebrate the 20th Anniversary of the ordination of women to the priesthood. It was an important milestone, and it was rightly and sensitively celebrated, but seeing the very large numbers involved makes one realise that ministry is for all of us. We had recently a wonderful gathering of Church Wardens, Treasurers and Deanery Synod Reps, at which we explored their particular ministries, and a choir workshop, which was a celebration of the ministry

Following the completion of the work we began to notice a very bad sulphur type smell both outside and inside our house first thing in the morning and last thing at night. This has been consistent now since the work has been completed and following quite a few telephone calls, visits from Severn Trent and a lot of head scratching we're still trying to identify the root cause.

We are aware there are a number of residents who are suffering from a similar situation but may not be reporting the problem to Severn Trent. If this is the case and you are concerned about reporting the problem, then I am happy to raise the wider problem to Severn Trent to help them identify the root cause.

NOTES OF THE OXHILL ANNUAL PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY 13th MAY 2014 AT 7.30 PM IN THE VILLAGE HALL

The meeting, chaired by Grenville Moore, was attended by Parish Councillors David Hill, Carol Taylor, Tom Heritage and Brian Badger

MATTERS DISCUSSED

Election of Officers

Grenville Moore would remain Chairman and Carol Taylor Vice Chairman for the forthcoming year.

Planning

As adjoining Parish we were notified of development at Hogwood Farm for erection of pig unit and grain store – we had no objection to these.

Planning permission had been granted for (1) demolition of existing dwelling and construction of two dwellings at Applegrove, and (2) replacement of guttering and rebuilding wall at The Manor.

Planning applications had been returned with no objection for, (1) removal of condition 3 of S86/0133 to remove personal use condition at Whitehill Cottage, (2) Fell Leylandi, Apple and Alder trees at The Old Church House, (3) Conversion of garage to form living accommodation (annexe) at Greenfields, (4) single storey side and rear extensions at Silverdale.

Planning amendment to insert utility window at The Maples returned with no objection but window glass must be obscure.

Planning application to demolish outbuildings and erect new dwelling at Ripplesdale with vehicular access off Green lane was returned with no planning objection but with a view that the building was large for the plot and bringing attention to promised “ecological enhancement” on the outline plan.

Planning application for erection of 4 dwellings at Fithers Field was returned with objections on the following grounds: infill of back land; would not enhance existing landscape character; width of road too narrow; exacerbating flooding in this area; the 5-bedroomed houses would not respect the character of the village; and noted that trees had already been felled on the proposed driveway without planning permission.

Finance

Clerk accepted an honorarium of £150, which included expense for the year to 31 March 2014. Mandatory insurance premium of £201.03 was paid unchanged from last year.

Clerk presented the year end accounts. Account of Receipts and Payments for year ended 31 March 2014 was signed as correct. Annual return accounting statement was approved and signed and Annual Governance statement signed. Bank reconciliation was provided. These returns will be sent for internal and external audit. Required notice had been posted for persons wishing to view accounts.

Highways

Pot holes still needed repairing and the road from Whatcote to Honington was in a bad state of repair. Highways to be notified.

At the end of this financial year 31 March 2015 I will have completed 36 years as Parish Clerk to Oxhill and have given in my notice. This coincides with the Parish Elections which will take place next year. If anyone would like to take up this position I will be pleased to explain what it entails.

NOTES OF THE ANNUAL PARISH MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY 13TH MAY 2014 AT 8.00 P.M. IN THE VILLAGE HALL

73 members of the village attended the meeting chaired by Grenville Moore, Chairman of Oxhill Parish Council.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read agreed and signed.

There were no matters arising and one item placed on the agenda.

The Leys Field Development Plan (rear of Whatcote Road and Main Street)

Grenville Moore opened by explaining what had happened to date.

A Parish Plan had been completed and adopted by the Parish Council at a meeting with the village on 11th February. This Parish Plan was then sent to Stratford District Council. Matthew Neal had been appointed Neighbourhood Planning Officer at SDC and is currently preparing a report to be presented to Cabinet on 14th June with a view to having the Oxhill Parish Plan adopted as a material consideration when determining planning applications.

Stratford District Council have now completed their Draft Core Planning Strategy document and forwarded it to Government on 12th May this sets out the District Councils plans for the next 15 years. In the Draft Core Strategy Oxhill has been identified has a Category 4 Local Service Village with 10-25 houses being built between now and 2029/30. With our low position in this category we expect around 15 homes being built.

The Parish Council met with Miranda Rogers of Stansgate Planning on 30th April to hear their proposals for outline planning on The Leys Field. Sue Hunt attended this meeting on behalf of the Parish Plan Committee. Stansgate were seeking outline planning, on behalf of their client, for 26 houses including social rented, low cost rental and shared equity. They said that this application would happen and it was the Parish Council's opportunity to suggest any changes. The P.C. would not be drawn into this because by doing so would have been accepting something and the Village are quite adamant that this centre piece of land should not be developed.

A vote was taken by those attending the meeting, by show of hands, and was unanimously against developing The Leys Field.

Stansgate are holding a Drop in public consultation on 14th May between 3.00p.m. and 7.30 p.m. It was asked that as many villagers as possible go along to this session and voice their opinion.

At the time that outline planning is submitted to the Parish Council for comment, those leaving their e-mail addresses would be notified so that they can also express an opinion.

Grenville Moore thanked everyone for coming along to the meeting.

Meeting closed at 9.10 p.m.

It is my wish to keep everyone in the village up to date on any development on this proposal, and in the event of it going to planning application, we will need a rapid response by email to the Planning Officer at Stratford District Council. It really is important to do this if you don’t want to see the loss of the unique character of the village. It doesn’t matter where you live in the village, it will affect you.

PARISH CLERK

At the Parish Council meeting Angela Kean gave notice that as of next year she will be standing down as Parish Clerk after many years of loyal service. Thoughtfully she has given us early notice so we can find and train up a new clerk. The role and duties of a Parish Clerk include issuing the legal summons to elected members to attend meetings of the parish council and any of its committees, together with handling legal and financial matters, correspondence, and any publicity or events.

The Parish Clerk is the proper officer and statutory office holder. They are not an elected member but an employee of the Council. They are the executive office of the Parish Council and as such responsible for implementing the Council’s decisions.

WHERE THERE'S A WILL THERE'S A WAY

Most Oxhillians will be well aware of the slave's grave in our churchyard. It is fairly common knowledge that Myrtila was probably brought to England from Nevis in the West Indies by one Thomas Beauchamp, who was married to Perletta Meese, twin daughter of the then Oxhill rector, Walwyn Meese. However, I believe little else has been documented about these families, apart from the baptisms of Perletta's siblings in the Oxhill registers, and some details about Perletta's brother, Walwyn, who was the rector of Holy Trinity, Stratford-upon-Avon. So on a slow weekend recently, I decided to see if anything of interest was available on the internet.

Almost immediately I scored a result, with the discovery of the will of Perletta Beauchamp, proved in September 1750. This makes reference to her two daughters, Finetta and Martha, as well as her late son, Meese Beauchamp. Perletta was then living in Greenwich, London, which is interesting as it may indicate the trade associated with the plantations on Nevis was using London as a port rather than, say, Bristol, which was the leading slave port between about 1730 and 1745.

On a roll, the same website then came up with wills for other family members. Out of all of them, though, my favourite has to be Robert Meese, Perletta's older brother, who was apparently a member of the legal profession in London. Not only does he seem to have a wry sense of humour (most unusual to find this illustrated in an 18th century will), but also humility. In his will of 1740, he says:

"...I give to my good sisters Madam Duncomb (Margaretta, Perletta's twin) and Mrs Beauchamp (Perletta) all my household goods now in their custody at Greenwich to be equally divided between them and I give them besides a guinea ring to each to keep if they please in remembrance of their dear departed brother whom they have always used with as much or more decent respect and kindness than they thought an elder brother deserved and hope they will not take it in ill part that I give them no larger legacys in regard they both enjoy ... plentiful estates ..."

And later, "... I give to the poor of Oxhill where I was born twenty pounds ... for I prefer these small charitable legacys much before a gaudy funeral earnestly desiring that mine may be very private and with as little expense as may be ..."

YOUR COMMUNITY ORCHARD

The blossom keeps coming and we look forward to getting a few fruits from the apples, apricots, damsons, quince, medlar and cherries. We still need to restrict the number of fruit as the trees are young.

After a really wet winter the sensory garden is flourishing and the ground covering is hardly visible! As the soil is free draining it suits the herbs and plants and they are loving it so we will have even more nectar for the bees and butterflies later in the year.

The work keeps going and we are slowly finishing the weeding and feeding of all the plants at the orchard, it is a big task but we are getting there. We have set up a nettle butt where we place nettles in a bag suspended in a water butt which will provide an organic feed during the summer in addition to the comfrey butt. There are lots of plants on site to keep both of them going!

The new sign for the orchard is installed in the hedge line by the main gate on the Shenington Road. It looks very good and we are grateful to all involved in the installation.

The Bee Team have harvested the first lot of honey from our bees which will be distributed amongst the members! A good thing to celebrate.
