NATURE NOTES FOR MARCH

March takes its name from Mars (Martius) the god of war. This was the month when military campaigns generally began, after the end of winter. In the early Roman calendar it was the first month of the year:

I Martius am! Once first, and now the third! To lead the Year was my appointed place; A Mortal dispossessed me by a word And set there Janus with the double face Hence I make war on all the human race.

On a lighter note, I have been cheered over the last few weeks by watching a pair of bullfinches on one of our feeders. In Chaucer's *The Romaunt of the Rose* he refers to bullfinches as Alpes and other finches as "jolly briddes smale" and he described them filling the air of a May morning with "the sweetness of hir melodye". Other names for the bullfinch exist such as Oif, Hoop, Mawp, Blood

Olp, Black Nob Monk, Budding bird and Lum Budder; these last two make reference to the birds' partiality to fruit buds. Chaucer makes reference in the *Romaunt* garden to "many hoomly trees" among them ash, apple, plum, pear, medlar and cherry, all very agreeable to this finch. They have distinct preferences as to variety, favouring James Grieve and one or two other dessert apples to cookers. It is interesting to note that amongst the cherries, only Morello buds are really appreciated; Conference, Williams and Dr Jules pears are eagerly sought,



though Comice and Hardy are ignored. All types of plum seem to be relished, gages in particular. The bullfinch will feed greedily on early buds with a capacity for eating 30 buds a minute, causing immense damage to orchards and fruit bushes. This led to persecution. In Elizabethan England a statute was passed outlawing the 'bulfynch' with a bounty of a penny a head, and until relatively recently many thousands were killed every year by commercial fruit growers. Thankfully today it is illegal to kill or trap bullfinches (except under special licence) because of the disastrous downward trend in the British population.

They are truly a delight to see in the garden, especially with the sun catching the deep warm red breast of the male, which is set off by the glossy jet black cap, bib and tail. The female is more of a gentle buff-pink and they always seem to be in pairs, although I can find no reference to them pairing for life. You can attract them into your garden by putting out a feeder with a good quality finch mix containing sunflower seeds.

In the Spring a fuller crimson comes upon the robin's breast; In the Spring the wanton Lapwing gets himself another crest; In the Spring a livelier iris changes on the burnished dove; In the Spring a young man's fancy lightly turns to thoughts of love

Don't forget though, March is not always a pleasant month: "March is the month that God designed to show those who don't drink what a



Would all villages kindly note that an application has been made to Stratford on Avon District Council for the closure of roads in and around the village of Oxhill on Sunday the 3rd and Monday the 4th June 2012 between 10am and midnight on both days.

Details of closure – Main Street & Church Lane, Oxhill - for their full length. Main Street from the junction with



Kineton Road and Whatcote Road at one end of the village until it becomes Church Lane and continuing to it's junction with Green Lane and Tysoe Road adjacent to the Church at the other end of the village. The length of Main Street between the Pub and its junction with Back Lane will be used for a Street Party and other Diamond Jubilee event activities. This full closure is desirable to ensure the safety of all taking part in the event by diverting traffic away from the centre of the village.

Diversionary Route – the alternative route during the period of closure will be via Green Lane and the Whatcote Road and represents only a minor detour. Access – will be maintained to all properties at all times.



WOULD YOU LIKE TO KEEP BEES?

A lot of people keep bees because they produce honey, one of the healthiest and most natural foods and one which has been valued by man since prehistory as a sweetener. Others keep bees because they are interested in the study of bees and of their habits; bees are fascinating creatures and there is always something new to learn about them. With no means of dealing with the ubiquitous



varroa mite that is now present in all UK honey bee colonies, a feral honey bee nest is unlikely to remain viable for more than a couple of seasons. With the help of beekeepers it is only managed colonies that can survive to carry out the essential pollination our food crops. Beekeeping is an enjoyable open air hobby bringing you in contact with people from all walks of life. Bees can be kept by almost everyone except a very small minority who are allergic to bee stings.

Shipston Beekeepers are holding an "Introduction to Beekeeping" day on Saturday 14th April at the Old Free School, Brailes OX15 5HT. The day will deal with the basics of beekeeping for the complete beginner or those with very limited experience of this craft.

There is a stock of over 2000 books (many in large print), a wide range of children's books, DVD's and access to the internet – and the first 30 minutes are free!


The Library is open in the Kineton Village Hall on Mondays 10.00-16.00 and Saturdays from 09.00-12.00. Parking is easy.

THE OXHILL GARDEN CLUB

"I know a bank where-on the wild thyme blows, where oxlips and the nodding violet grows..."

Shakespeare was reputed to have been an avid gardener, sharing cuttings from New Place, his retirement home. Certainly his literary works are peppered with well-informed references to flowers, trees and herbs.



As we strolled through three gardens of the Shakespeare Trust, guided expertly by Roger Pringle at the January meeting, it was easy to imagine that these gardens are remnants of Tudor times. However, Roger showed us with a host of photographs, paintings and documents that the original spaces were far from these.

When we see the exquisite planting around Anne Hathaway's family home it is difficult to imagine the hovel that the Birthplace Trust bought and resurrected in Victorian times, and that the small arboretum surrounding it was only planted in 1988.

I imagine tourists visiting the Birthplace would be fascinated to see those pictures of the place's re-invention in recent times because the gardens seem to be an integral part of the whole. The garden at New Place was also reconstructed in the 1920's.

Using many species of plants mentioned by Shakespeare the gardens are masterpieces, veritable works of art which evoke real Englishness.

Keeping the Tudor garden alive is easy, just use some of these – rosemary, pansies, fennel, columbine, violets, roses, daisies, willow, daffodils, oxlips, lilies, poppies, lady-smocks...... Google the entire list... and if anyone has a spare root or two of Eglantine I would be very interested!

ROGUE TRADERS

Shipston SNT would like to make you aware of the following.

Please can we ask you to be on the lookout for rogue traders operating from a white Ford Transit van with the registration number NG54 OPA. These traders are offering to replace guttering and claddings in the Stratford and Bidford areas but intelligence suggests that this may well be more widespread.

Trading Standards have been alerted but please could we remind you to take the following steps when using a contractor or trader in order to protect your property and yourself:

- Always ask for identification and check the authenticity of it by checking the number given, either in the phone book or on the internet. Do not ring the number on the card given as this may be bogus and another member of the rogue trading team could be on the end of the phone waiting for your call.
- This may take a few minutes but a genuine caller/ trader will understand and will not mind waiting.
- Always use a trusted company. Use someone who has been recommended to you or someone that you have found through the telephone book or a trade directory.
- · Always get a minimum of three quotes to make a comparison and to ensure that you are not being overcharged. Ensure that you get a copy of the estimate in writing before work commences.
- Do not be intimidated by callers at your door. You are allowed to say NO. You are even allowed and encouraged not to answer the door to anyone you do not know or are not expecting.

If in doubt always ask the visitor to call back when you have a neighbour or relative with you. Legitimate traders will be happy to do this and anyone calling from the utility companies will have made an appointment with you before attending your home.
