TYSOE CHURCH OF ENGLAND PRIMARY SCHOOL - FEBRUARY UPDATE

It has been a busy and eventful half-term. Music has featured highly and many of our children (53% of our Year 2 - 6) now have instrument lessons in school, including for piano, drums, guitar, violin and trombone. The Year 6 children performed with the famous African Children's Choir on stage in the Leamington Spa Theatre. It was a fantastic experience to be part of such a large and exuberant choir.

Many of the African children have lost one or both parents to poverty and disease. The School Council chose to raise money for the choir by having a 'Pyjamas and Onesies' day which raised almost £100.

We are delighted that Tysoe Utilities Estate Trust has again awarded Tysoe School a grant of £1200, which we will use to sponsor a wide range of curriculum events over the year. Last year, this included trips to the RSC theatre, Warwick Castle, an Egyptian workshop and African drumming. It also supported the week's residential trip to Swanage. This generous donation really enriches the opportunities

that benefit all pupils. In addition, the Trust has provided a second grant of £1600 to pay for swimming lessons. We are very grateful for their continued support.

We also welcomed back local author, Beki Benjamin and Illustrator, Josh Welsby who came into school to read their new publication, 'Up the Apple Tree'. The children enjoyed listening to the story, written by Beki and to have the opportunity to see the original illustrations by Josh. We look forward to another visit as part of a World Book Day event in March.

Oxhill Garden Club

On Thursday 14th February, Philip Aubrey gave a talk to members on the topic 'The answer lies in the soil'. Patently a rich loam with a pH value (acidity level) suitable for the particular plants, shrubs and vegetables favoured by the gardener is the ideal, but few gardens start off this way. It is an ongoing challenge to keep the soil aerated, water retentive and with the necessary minerals and other nutrients required for the diverse range of flora that we attempt to grow year on year.



Gardening isn't for everyone and more and more households are investing in 'maintenance free' decking, paved areas and pot plants. Philip, however, was in the business of imparting the secrets of 'good soil' gardening. He believed that he could make an educated guess as to the acid / alkali level of any particular patch of ground and its nutritive state by virtue of the small flora, lichens or mosses growing on the surface and their colour, or lack of it. To be sure, however, he advocated the use of a soil testing kit to establish, and then keep an eye on, the pH of different parts of the garden. The top four inches of soil should be scraped away and a sample taken of the exposed layer beneath. For lawns, one could take a conical divot the size of a carrot and just test the soil at the tip.

Philip had experienced both sandy and clay soils in his gardening life. Each had their problems, but both could be improved by the digging in of well composted materials – the leafy parts of prunings, vegetable kitchen waste, chicken and horse manure, most weeds, and copious amounts of leaf litter. The woodier parts of prunings he burnt, putting the ash on the compost heap – of which he always

had two on the go. Albeit a naturally 'hot' compost heap is required to kill weed seeds, it is the small insects, fungi and bacteria in the rotted material dug into the ground on a seasonal basis that improves the soil. Scattered, sieved 'second soil' from discarded potted plants, too, has its place as a lawn improver.

Given the basic premise that quality homemade compost was a prerequisite to keeping garden soil in good heart, it was quite sobering to see the range of proprietary brands of soil 'conditioners' that Philip brought along to illustrate the curative measures he suggested could be taken to resolve particular problems or soil deficiencies. All in all, members were treated to a master-class of how to garden even better knowing what lies beneath our feet and how to make it more productive.

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The next event in the Club's calendar is the AGM. Join us 7.00 for 7.30pm on Thursday March 14th in the village Hall for a convivial glass of wine prior to the evening's business. This will be followed by a cheese etc. small plate buffet accompanied by more fruit of the vine and soft(er) drinks. John, please bring a few extra bottles!

What is WOT2Grow?



A Community Orchard that was planted in 2011 for the benefit of the local communities but especially Whatcote, Oxhill and Tysoe!

The orchard is run by a company that is not for profit and managed by the people who become members (shareholders) in the company. The members are the ones who get the fruit, none is sold, along with the infirm and elderly in the villages, the Tysoe Lunch Club and the local Care Homes.

The orchard covers two acres and has soft fruit - raspberries, blackcurrants, red and white currants, gooseberries, logan and tayberries, and blueberries - 20 varieties of apples (cookers and eaters), 3 varieties of pears, 4 varieties of plums as well as apricots, greengages, damsons, cherries, nectarines, peaches and nuts. Some cider apples and perry pears have also been planted. Although there will be fruit each year the amount obviously varies but there is fruit from July through December.

There is a strong sustainable and environmental focus in the management of orchard, natural biodiversity has increased immensely since 2011 and beehives have been introduced producing delicious honey. Trees, bushes and canes are treated with organic plant protection products and fertilisers. Pests and diseases are controlled by natural means and by in-built plant resistance.

The members, and families, and friends maintain the orchard by doing the planting, mulching, pruning, fruit thinning and harvesting, grass mowing and site maintenance.



Grenadier Apples

There is a one off cost to become a member of £25 and thereafter an annual maintenance fee currently £15. These fees are used to pay for insurances etc. and the cost of things needed to maintain the orchard, none of the members receives payment for work done!
