BIG KIDS AND LITTLE KIDS - APPLE DAY AT THE ORCHARD!

October is the season of rich autumnal colours. Fruit is in abundance and often all over the grass on our lawns and paddocks. Apple Day is all about converting some of the harvest and the good wind fallen fruit to useful juice. We have held Apple Day's for 5 years now. The weather has been bright, breezy if a little chilly by late afternoon. Here we were; Year 6 and putting up the Flower Show tent as the heavens were opening. Our luck had been used up!



Yet by 1.30pm the rain had cleared the sun came out and with it the machines that make up the magic of converting fallen apples into juice. These machines are big kids' toys. They

have wonderful names like scratters and presses. Many helping hands are needed to chop the fruit to feed the machines. Youngsters get to turn the handles on the machines, barrow away the spent fruit and join in the treasure hunt in the orchard to find missing pieces.



The fruit comes in trugs and bags from people's gardens and this year we had a significant quantity of WOT2Grow fruit. Everyone brings along containers to carry away the juice, which is best consumed within 48

hours, or freeze it for a Christmas treat. We fortify ourselves with tea, coffee and cake and as much juice as you want. The cake and jam stall thrived as usual.

This is a high energy day and as if on cue the rain came back at 4pm to wash down the equipment! Thanks are due to all those who came along to enjoy the day, those who made the cakes and the Flower Show for the loan of their tent. Our next high energy event is the Wassail on January 21st 2017. In the meantime the Orchard goes peacefully back to a pleasant green and open space.



OXHILL GARDEN CLUB

On Thursday 15th September, a week later than scheduled, members were treated to a talk by local historian Andrew Baxter titled *Edgehill – Tales of Tea Gardens and Tragedy*. The late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries saw an influx of visitors wanting to see the then famous Roman ruins located opposite the now Castle Hotel & Restaurant at Edgehill. So much so that some half a dozen tearooms existed in this tiny hamlet of just sixteen dwellings to cater (sic) for the refreshment needs of the curious. “What Roman ruins?” you may well ask, for not a trace (well, just three stones) remains today. The imposing ‘ruins’ in fact were built in the 1740s as a folly to the designs of Radway Estate owner and amateur architect Sanderson Miller who also commissioned the castle with its octagonal tower to be built in mock Gothic style in Hornton stone quarried locally. Indeed we were shown slides of Andrew’s own sunken garden naturally ‘walled’ by this Jurassic ironstone.

Andrew illustrated his talk with pictures of today alongside contemporary postcards and photographs featuring the various tea gardens. He also brought along examples of the now very collectible pottery and ornaments sold to visitors as souvenirs of the occasion.

Having entertained his audience with this vignette of a little known aspect of Edgehill’s history, Andrew whetted our interest by mentioning the Edge Hill Light Railway that once transported quarried ironstone to the Stratford-upon-Avon and Midland Junction Railway for onward shipment – but that, hopefully, is another story, or perhaps a visit, for a future Garden Club event.



WOT2GROW COMMUNITY ORCHARD

There are very few raspberries left! It seems they don't know that autumn is only just upon us and as per previous years the second week in October sees the end of picking. Not the massive quantities of previous years but still a reasonable amount picked by the few regular workers at the orchard. However this has been balanced by the apples and cider apples, what a great crop we have had and more to come. The cider apples, Dabinett, Yarlington Mill, Tom Putt, Kingston Black and Michelin have provided enough fruit to make three demijohns of cider!!! Hopefully we have got it right and the Wassail, on Saturday January 21th 2017, will be the chance to sample it! We will also have mulled cider and apple juice.

A lot of the apples were used to make juice on Apple Day as although some of our members have been tasting the different varieties there were lots left over. We managed to pick some pears, Doyenne du Comice, Onward and Concord, before the birds got to them and although a small crop this year it is great that they have fruited as it can take many a year for them to produce!

Still have lots of maintenance to do and we need to complete tying in the canes on summer raspberries also pruning of the currants and gooseberries still needs to be done.

Our next project is getting under way as we plan our raised beds for planting blueberries. These are classed as a super fruit and will also give us the opportunity for people to learn about growing these lovely fruits.

STOUR SINGERS – SING, LEARN, AND ENJOY

With a membership of more than 80 people, Stour Singers, under the skilled direction of Richard Emms, focus this autumn on two 18th century works, and an early 20th century composition. When Handel's Messiah was first performed in 1742 at Mr. Neale's Great Music Hall. Fishamble Street in Dublin, it was an immediate success, and continues as one of the best-loved oratorios. The choir's Christmas concert, on Saturday 10th December at 7.30.p.m. in St. Edmund's Church, features excerpts from Messiah, and a celebratory cantata by Telemann, where the choir become 'angels' singing "Glory To God In The Highest". Vaughan Williams' Five Mystical Songs are settings of George Herbert poems, blending moving baritone solos with choral accompaniment. Audience participation is also invited, indeed expected, in a number of carols. The choir is joined by the Birmingham Conservatoire orchestra – The Queen's Park Sinfonia, and renowned baritone soloist, Robert Rice. Robert started his musical career as a choral scholar at Kings College Cambridge, and has a very diverse repertoire encompassing opera, oratorio, recitals, and a particular interest in contemporary music.

Natalie Montakhab, soprano soloist, who delighted audiences in recent performances with Stour Singers, has graciously agreed to become the choir's first Honorary Fellow. Natalie stars as Yum-Yum in the English National Opera's forthcoming production (2017) of The Mikado, and is a lead figure in supporting music in hospitals.

Stour Singers offers much more than the opportunity to perform beautiful choral works. As a "come-all" choral society, it is keen to ensure that everyone gets the most out of being a member, and a recent informal workshop (led by recently-arrived Shipston resident, Barbara Divers) made a big difference for those who wanted to know more about the mysteries of reading and understanding music and sight-singing. Social events form part of the life of the choir, too, with an October Supper and Skittles evening.
